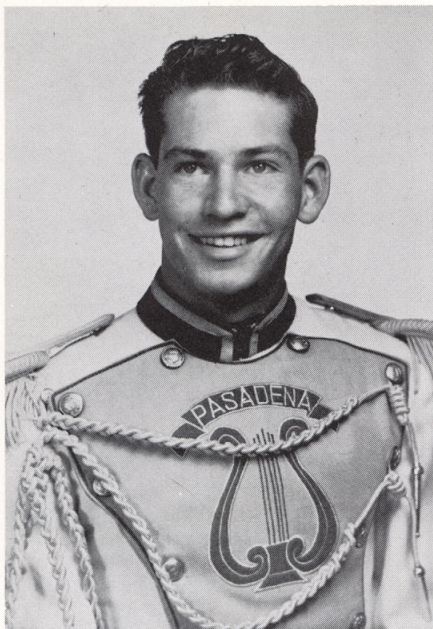

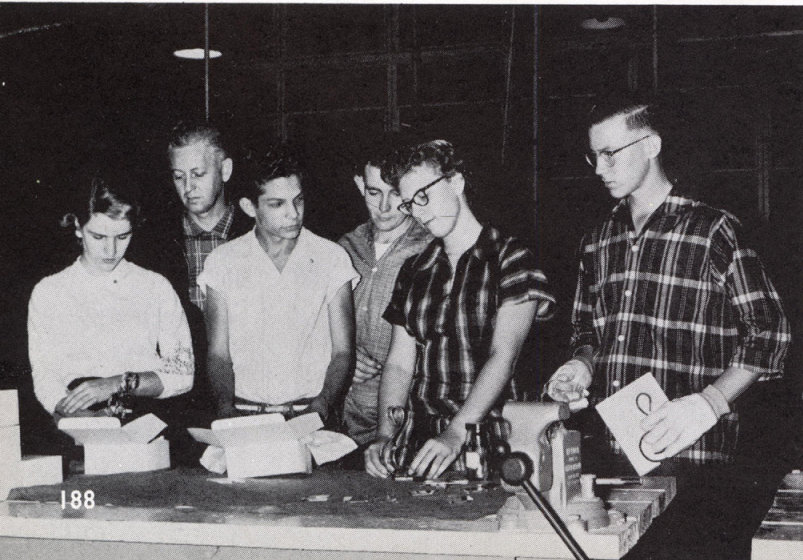

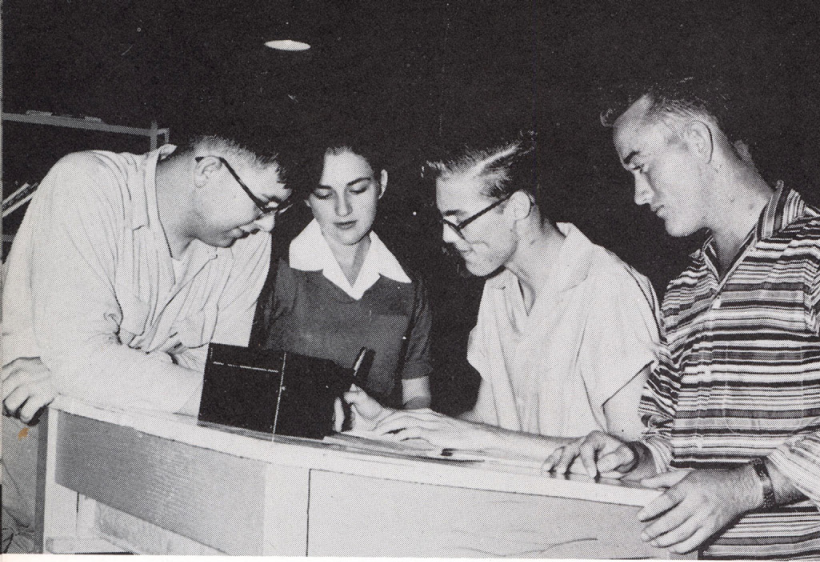

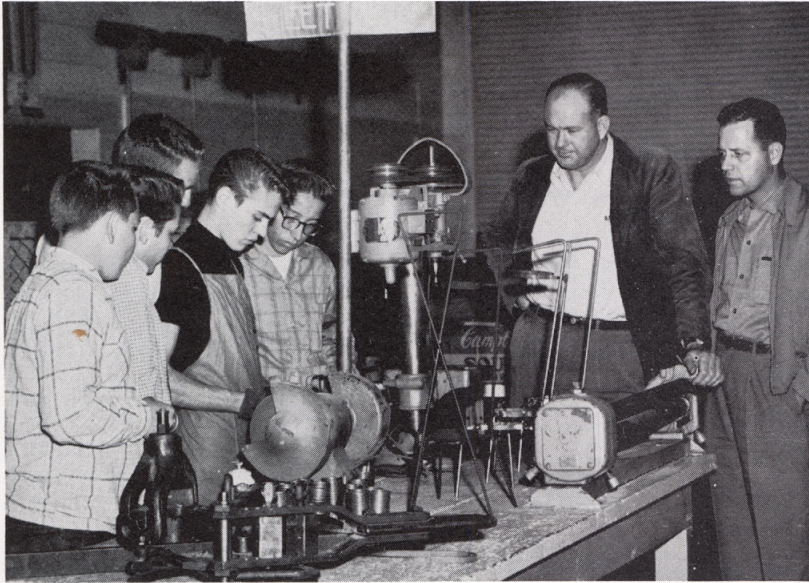

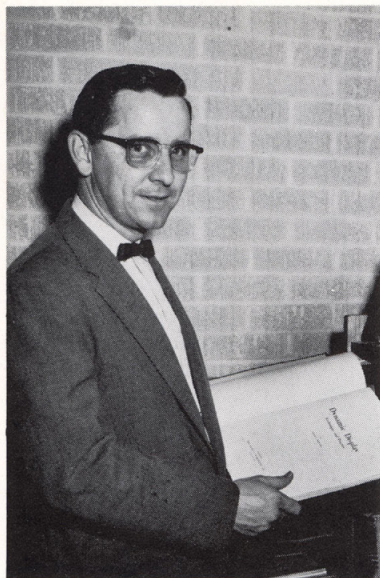
FUTURE NURSES

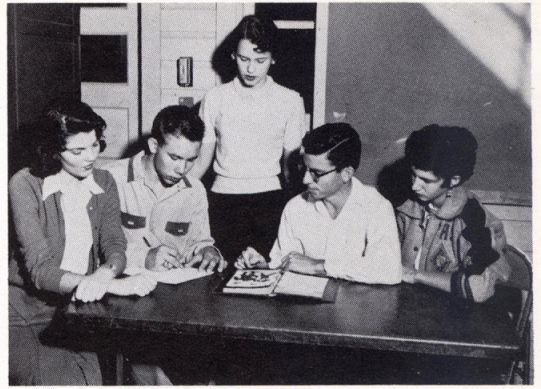
Making change quickly and correctly is important in Distributive Education.

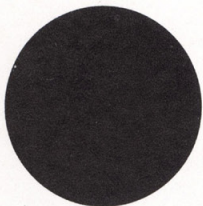

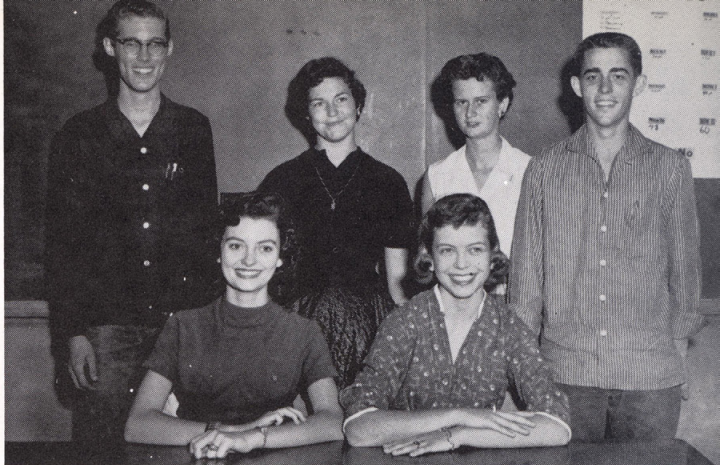

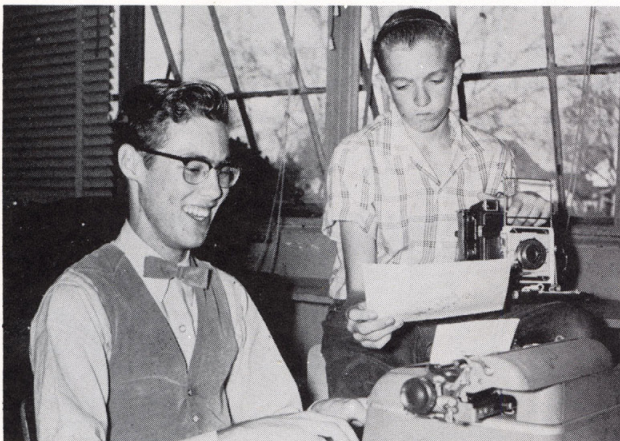

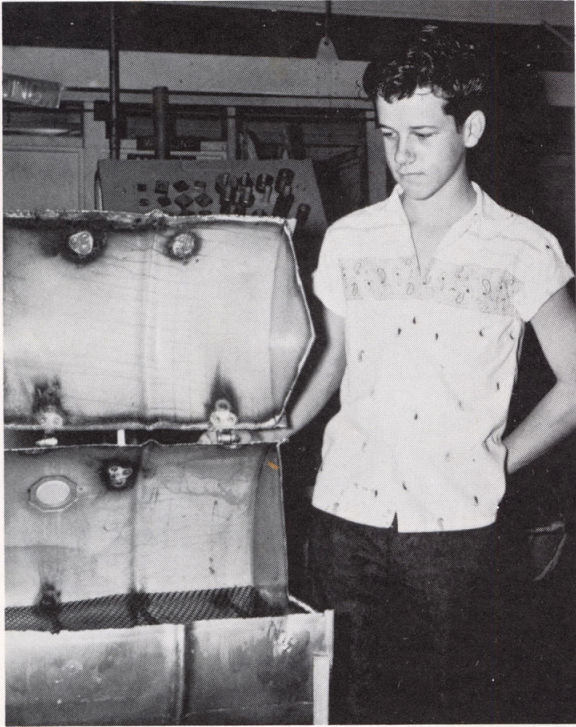

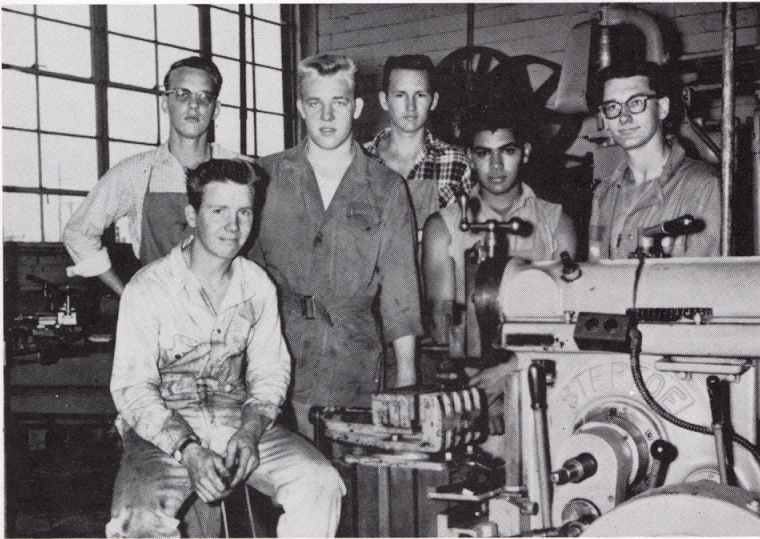

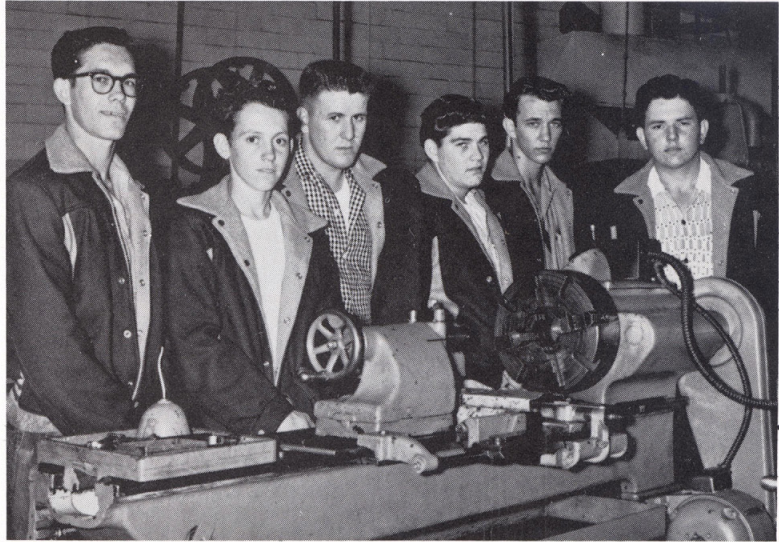

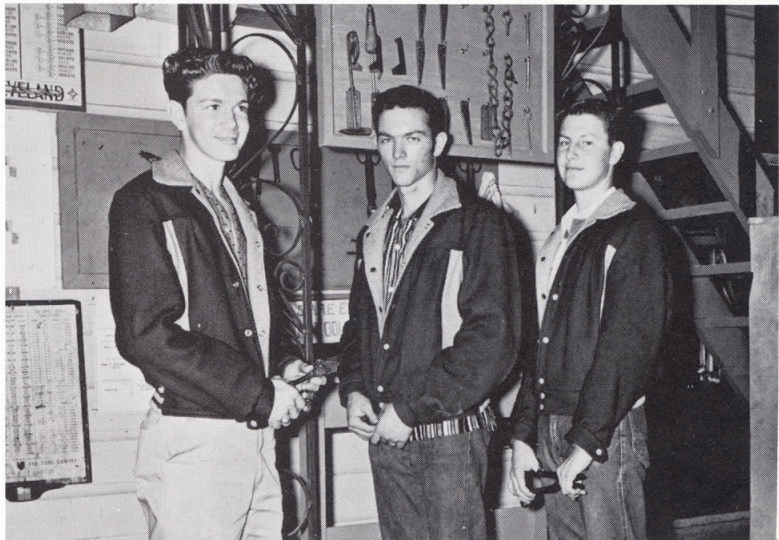

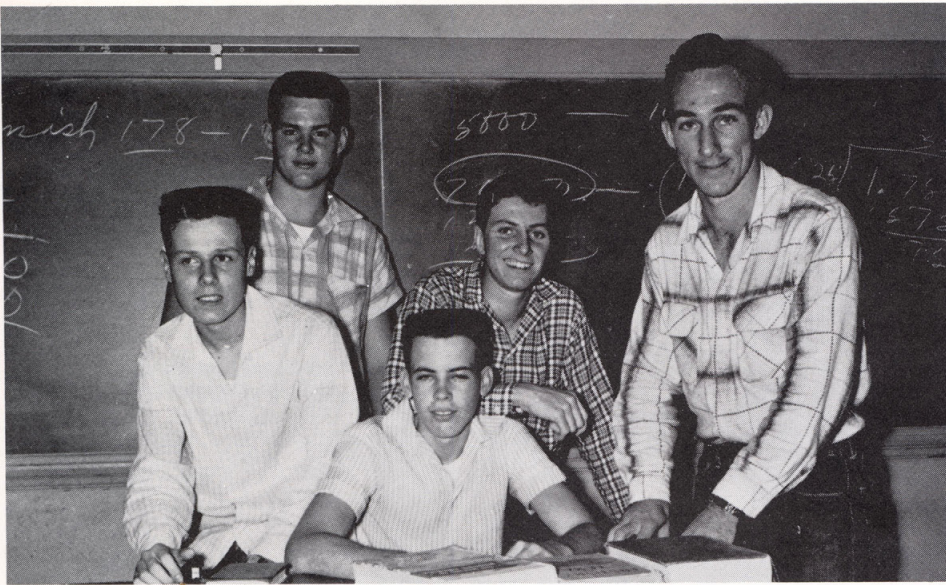

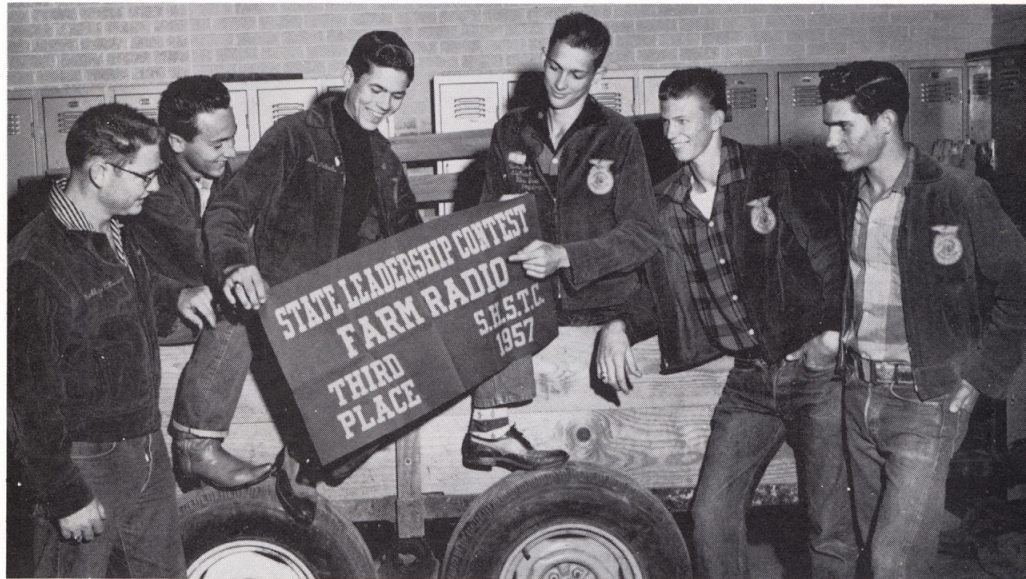
