
Eagles Open With Victories

The 1964 varsity football squad started the season hoping to prolong the twelve game undefeated streak from the previous year. After three weeks of tedious practice, the Eagles, rated fourth in pre-district polls, took to the familiar Memorial Stadium turf to face their first opponent.

The Eagles opened their campaign against the highly rated South Houston Trojans. Starting the game as underdogs, the Eagles quickly showed they came prepared to win. Galen Russell's pass interception on the Trojan's 35 yard-line set up the game's only touchdown. With just minutes left in the first quarter, John Burns passed 14 yards to Everett Williams for the score. Gary Barfield's conversion raised the margin to 7-0. The lone touchdown stood as the two outstanding defenses battled equally the rest of the game. This upset win vaulted the Eagles into the state's top ten ratings.




Junior halfback Jimmy Lewis finds running room around end in season's opener.



The Eagles fought their way from behind to defeat the Port Arthur Yellow Jackets in their powerful attempt to gain revenge for two one-point defeats of last season. On their own field, the Jackets scored first when their fullback plunged over for the final few feet. They split the uprights for the extra point. The clock was ticking off the first half when John Burns passed to the two yard line. Out of time-outs, the Eagles skipped the formalities of a huddle and with no time left in the half Burns tossed to Larry Henson for the team's first six points. In the third quarter, Jimmy Lewis sprinted thirty yards to the Port Arthur fifteen. From there the Eagles drove the ball to the one yard line. On his second attempt Burns lunged in for the score. The fourth quarter was a seesaw battle between two superb defenses. Although both teams threatened in the closing minutes, the score remained 12-7.






Eagle linebacker Tim Gentry (60) plays off a blocker as Mark Wilcox (70) moves in to make the tackle.


The Eagles' opponents in the third game of the season were the Port Neches Indians. Port Neches pushed across 7 points the first time they had the ball and held the lead until just before half-time when Larry Henson caught a 10 yard pass from John Burns for the touchdown. The same combination worked for the extra point, and the Eagles had a halftime lead of 8-7. In the third quarter, the visiting Indians went ahead again by a 14-8 score. The Eagles tied the game late in the fourth quarter with an 80 yard drive attempt. The march took 20 plays, with Burns scoring on a one-yard plunge with only 1:27 showing on the clock. The extra point was wide, and the Eagles were forced to accept a 14-14 deadlock.

Eagles Defeat

The Eagles overpowered the Texas City Stingarees in Pasadena's first district game. Midway in the second quarter, the visiting Pasadenians drove to the one yard line. From there Carl Scott sped around the end for the first half's only points. Scott scored again in the third quarter, this time from the five. He also picked up the two extra points. In the fourth quarter, Ben Basey intercepted a pass on the Stingaree thirty-six, setting up the Eagles' third score, a 30 yard pass from John Burns to Jimmy Lewis. Burns' pass to Larry Henson was good for the two points. Gary Barfield recovered a fumble on the Texas City thirty yard line which resulted in Pasadena's final score. The touchdown came when Steve Starkey found running room around the left end and crossed the goal from ten yards out, leaving the score 28-0.




Albert Petter (44) snags a pass against the Exporters as Gary Bennett (82) looks to block.




Larry Henson cradles a touchdown pass as disgusted Shippers look on.

The Big Green's excellent field position, setting up both of their touchdowns, can be attributed to Vernon Nixon's outstanding punting. The Eagle defense, playing great defensive ball and still unscored on in district play, deserved a major portion of the credit for the Eagle's second consecutive victory.

Eagles Suffer

The Eagles met the Ball High Tornadoes on the Tornadoes' home field in the season's third district game. The fired-up visiting Eagles quickly secured the lead. After driving to the one-yard line, the Eagles received a five-yard penalty. Carl Scott swept end for six yards and the touchdown on the next play, and Dwain Oliver's extra point made the score 7-0. Later in the first period Scott threw a short pass to quarterback John Burns, who scampered 23 yards for the tally. Once again Oliver converted. Ball High tallied six points in the second quarter on a recovered fumble in end zone, but the Eagles roared back for another touchdown. The Scott to Burns combination worked once more for forty-six yards. Oliver's kick was good for the point and the score was raised to 21-6. Galveston dominated the third quarter and managed one more score. In the fourth quarter the Eagle defense stalled the Tor threat and emerged victorious 21-12.

The fighting Eagles suffered their first loss of the season and their first defeat in eighteen games as they lost a heartbreaking 9-6 decision to a fired-up Baytown team. Baytown scored first on a 43 yard run. The Ganders' extra point attempt was blocked by Kary Rusk, leaving the score at 6-0. Later, in the second quarter, Baytown scored again on a 40 yard field goal, which gave the Ganders a 9-0 halftime advantage. The third quarter was a scoreless defensive battle, but in the fourth quarter Pasadena scored after an eighty yard drive. Melvin Murray slammed over the two yard line for the points. Dwain Oliver's extra point attempt was blocked by the Ganders, who held on for triumph.


Before a homecoming crowd of 16,000 the Eagles played the district-leading Galena Park Jackets and lost hopes for the district championship with a 20-7 defeat. The Jackets scored on a 74 yard pass the first time they had the ball. Pasadena came back after the ensuing kickoff to register their lone touchdown, following an 81 yard drive. Quarterback John Burns gained the score after a two yard plunge. The point after touchdown was added by fullback Dwain Oliver. Galena Park scored again before halftime on a 12 yard pass. A fourth quarter interception set up the Jackets' third score. In the Jackets' following games they advanced to the state finals, losing only to Garland, 26-20, for the championship. The play of the Galena Park team lessened the disappointment of Pasadena's boosters.



PHS Finishes

A dreary Friday the 13th marked the first game between the Green and White of PHS and the inexperienced but enthusiastic Texans of Sam Rayburn. The scrappy Texans carried the fight to the bigger Eagles in the first half, and at the midway rest period neither team had managed to tally. In the third period, Pasadena High's superiority finally showed. Ben Basey's 55 yard punt return gave Pasadena fine field position, and fullback Dwayne Oliver scored five plays later on a two yard slant over tackle. John Burns rolled around end for the conversion to make the score 8-0. In the final minutes, Coach Barfield's group scored again, this time on a beautiful 21 yard pass from Burns to Larry Henson. Basey returned to the game and skirted the Rayburn end for the points after touchdown. The final minute elapsed with no change, and the two schools' first meeting was entered in the books as a 16-0 victory for the Green and White.

High school football careers ended for 27 Pasadena seniors in the season's finale with the LaMarque Tigers. LaMarque, a new entry in 12-4A after many years in 3-A, showed a potent ground attack and effective air arm in their offensive attack. The Tigers' Norman Bulaich, an All-State halfback, kicked a 30 yard field goal with 3:38 remaining in the first quarter. Pasadena fought back with a 51 yard second period drive. Steve Ohm's 23 yard run and John Burns' 17 yard touchdown scamper were the big plays in the march. The extra point attempt failed, the half-time score standing at 6-3. LaMarque scored shortly after the second half kick-off. Recovering a Pasadena fumble on the Eagle 40, LaMarque moved in for the score in only four plays. Although they missed the extra point, the touchdown was enough to insure a 9-6 victory for the tough Tiger team.


Season






Don Howell (41) puts the pressure on Jacket ball handler.

The tall and experienced Gander team was never able to get its offense moving against the shorter, but more aggressive, Eagles.


Coach Hugh McGaugh's Eagles grabbed the league lead with a 56-41 triumph over the Galveston Tors in a game played on the Tor's home court. Senior Ricky Henson led Pasadena with 17 points and numerous rebounds.

Eagles Grab District Lead

Pasadena scored its third straight district win without a defeat as it leveled the Sam Rayburn Texans, 56-37. Pasadena's well-balanced offense was spearheaded by Henson, Nicholson, and Billy Standley, with 15, 14, and 12 points, respectively.

Jim Nicholson (51) scores on a fall-away jump shot during the LaMarque game.


Nicholson's dead-eye shooting and the steady play of Standley led the Eagles to a 49-46 decision over the LaMarque Tigers. Nicholson had 23 points and Standley 12 as the Pasadena team ran its district record to 4-0.

Pasadena edged Texas City 60-58 in a game in which neither team gained more than a 4-point advantage. Forward Nicholson led the Eagles with one of his finest games, 29 points and 14 rebounds.

Raising their record to 6-0, the flying Eagles swooped past the Brazosport Exporters, 56-43. Standley and Senior Forward George Burkhalter led the Eagles in scoring, with 18 and 15 points, respectively. Henson's 10 rebounds helped Pasadena to dominate the boards and control the pace of the game.

Still shaky from the Galena Park game, the Eagle Cagers went down to the Baytown Ganders, 50-47. This defeat left Pasadena a 6-2 record in district play. Nicholson again led the Eagle scoring parade with 17 points.

Nicholson with 21 points and Billy Standley with 19 led the Eagles to a 65-34 victory over Ball High of Galveston. The win enabled Pasadena to maintain a tie with Texas City for the district lead.




Sonny Coffman lays up two at the Smiley game.






Billy Standley (55) snatches a rebound from the Texan backboard.

Eagles Finish


Still reaching for the district championship, Pasadena flew by the Brazosport Exporters, 66-50. Ricky Henson's 23 points led the Eagles, but support was also added by Billy Standley and Jim Nicholson with 15 and 13 points, respectively.

Pasadena saw their championship hopes go up in smoke against the red-hot shooting of G. P.'s Jackets. Falling behind early in the game, Pasadena was never able to catch the tough Jacket fire. Nicholson with 13, and James Coffman and Standley with 12 each, kept Pasadena in the game until late in the fourth quarter.




Ricky Henson (42) struggles with a Galena Park cager for a rebound.










EAGLES 4 LaMARQUE 3
















Two Pasadena swimmers battle stroke for stroke in a furious drive to the finish line.










