
The employment of teachers, the management of funds, adoption of a yearly budget, and the maintenance and construction of buildings are just a few of the responsibilities of the school board.


Under the guidance of these two efficient and capable educators, PHS functions smoothly and soundly.






While English is considered old and unchanging, the English department of PHS attempts to stay abreast of current developments. It is essential that students study not only basic English grammar, but also composition and literature.


