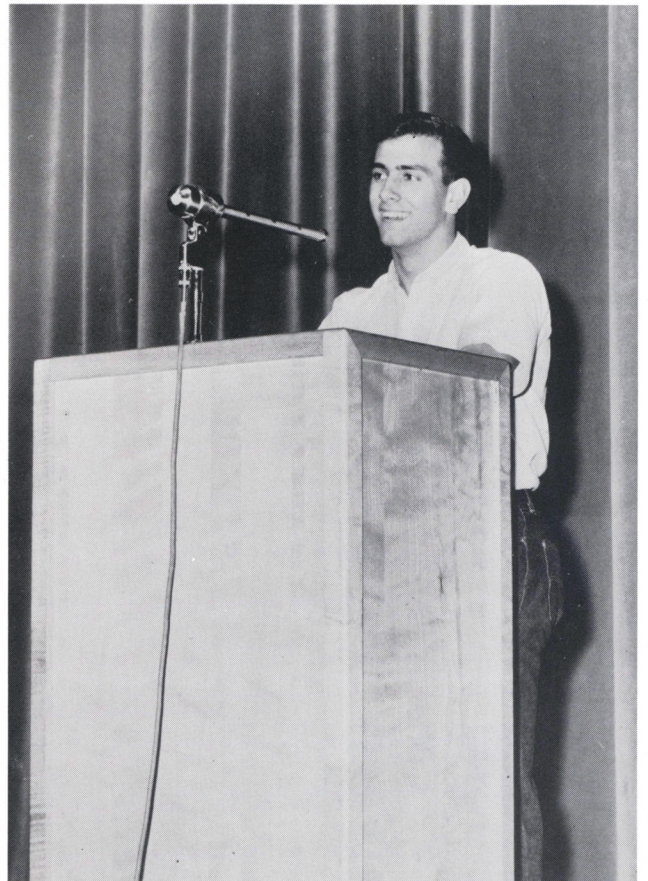


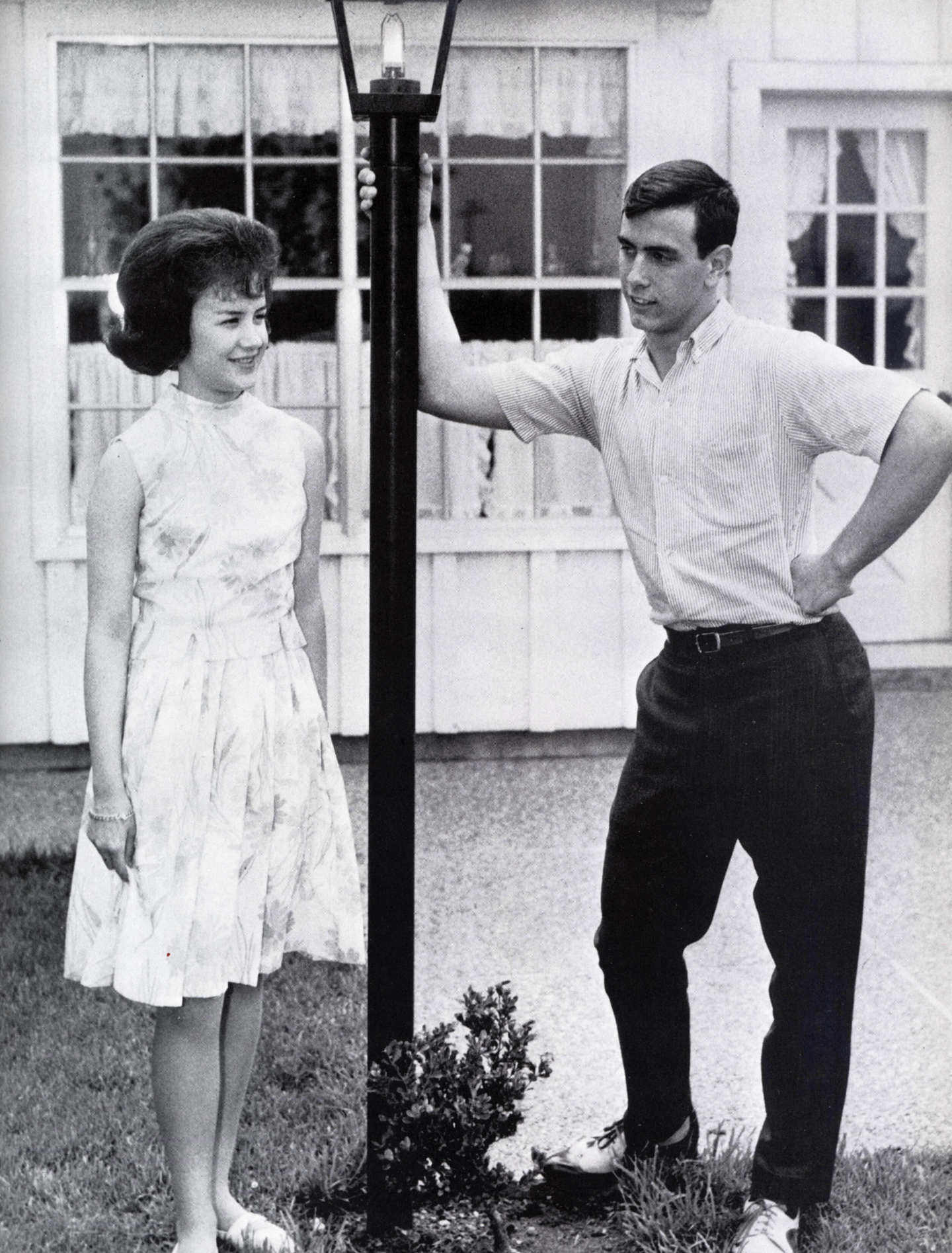
Sophomores Prefer Bilnoski and Trank

Sophomores Assume Duties

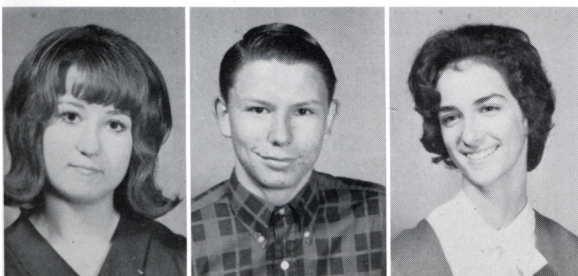

December Brings

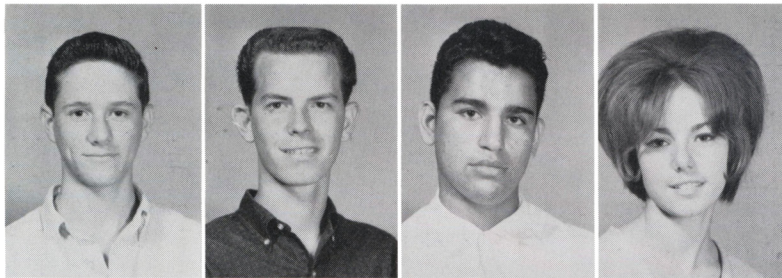

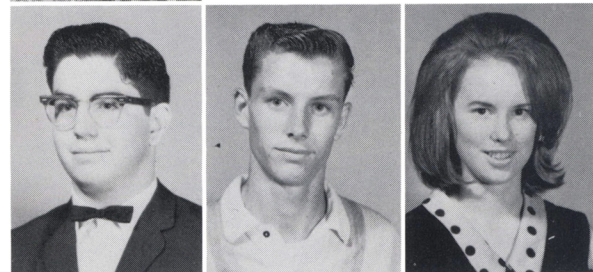
Demonstrate Talents
