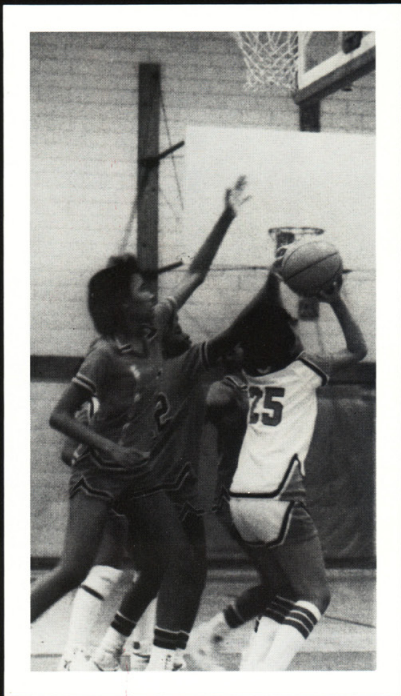
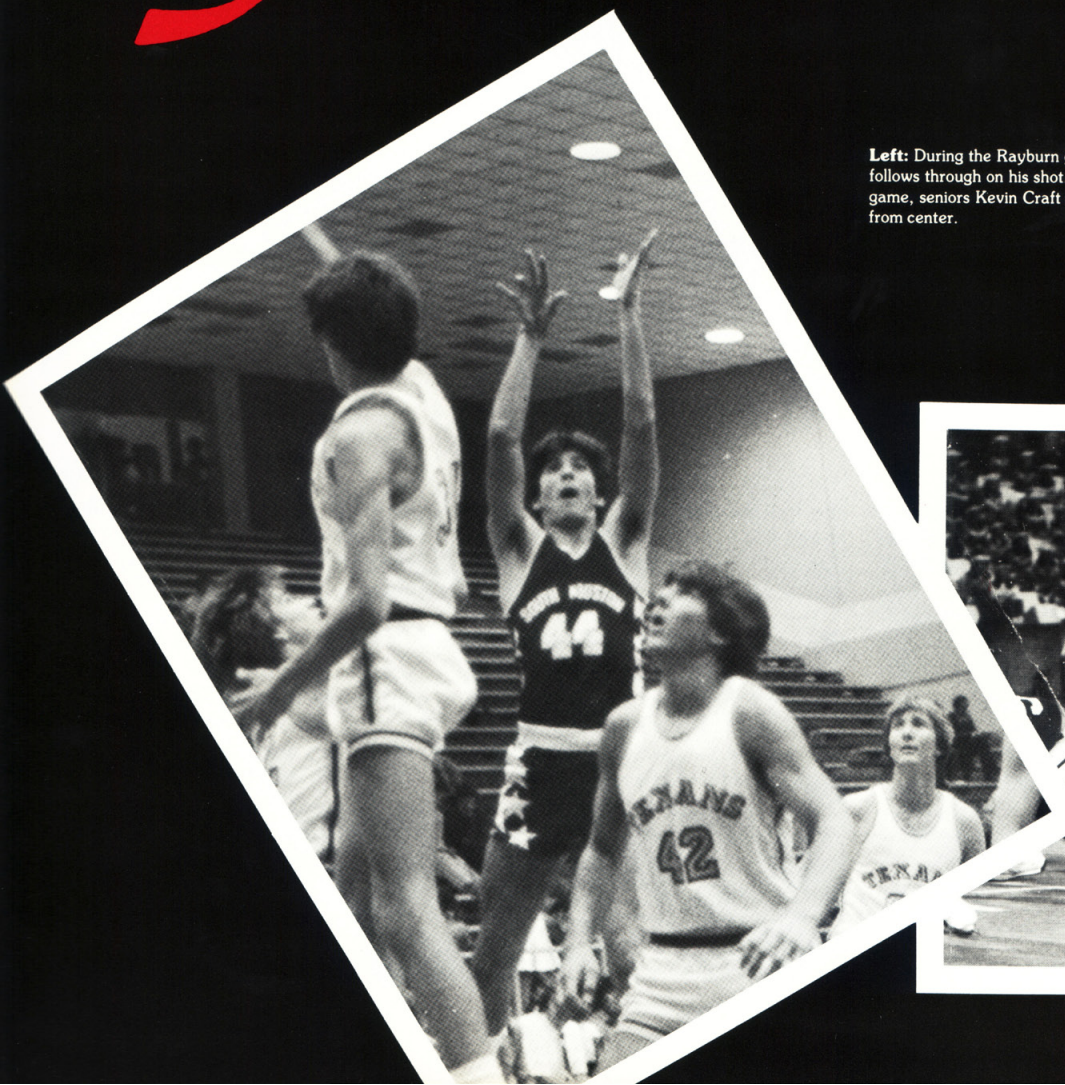

"Before the season started, the papers had us picked last in district. We ended

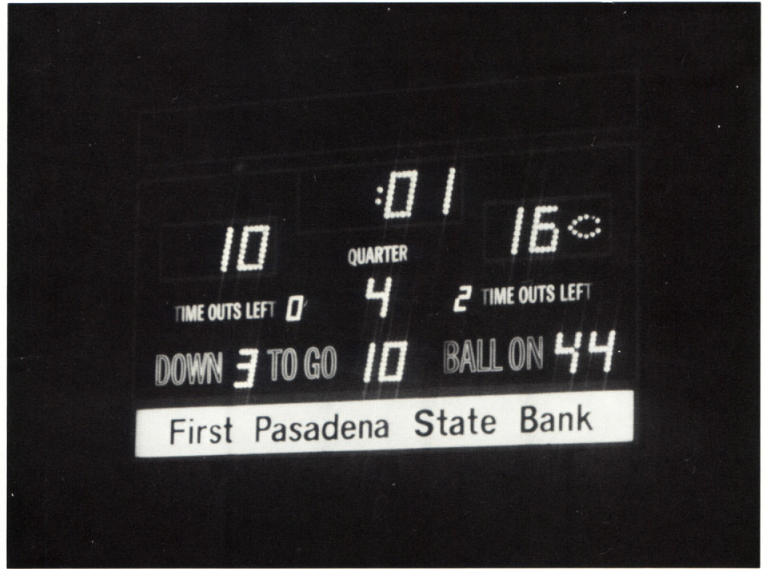

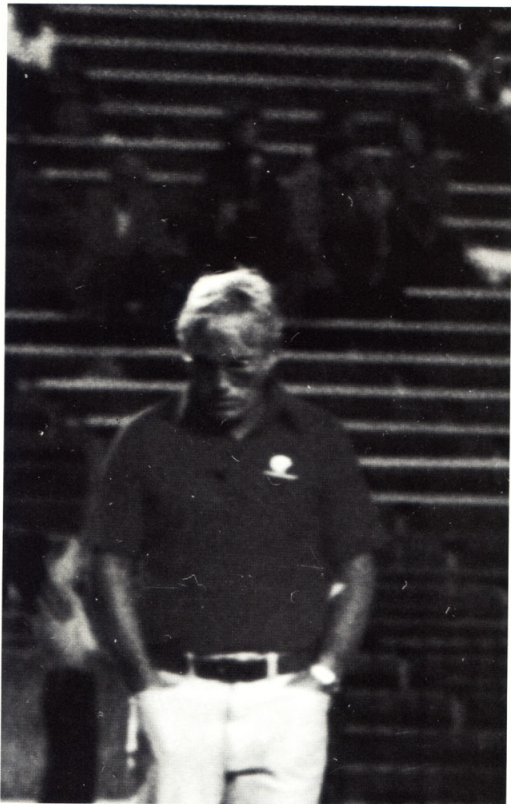

around the gazebo.

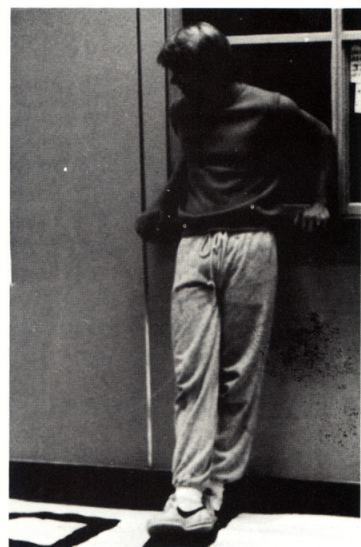
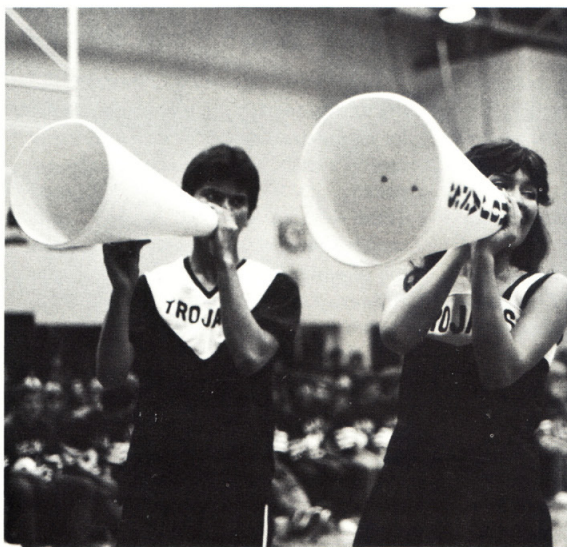

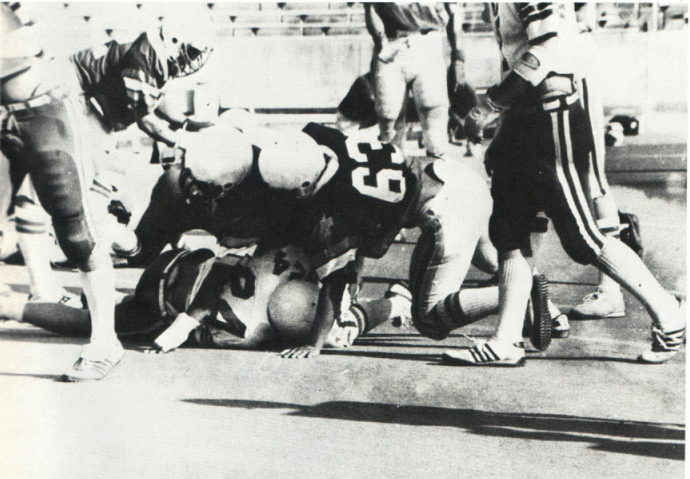


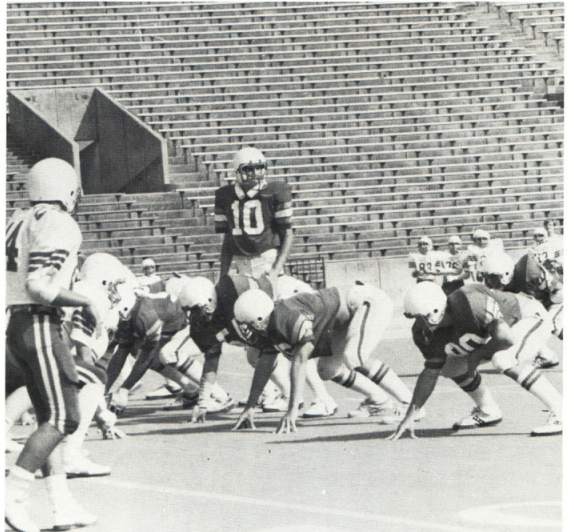

Chris Crews said, "I felt it helped me a lot to be a trainer because I made many friends and learned first aid."

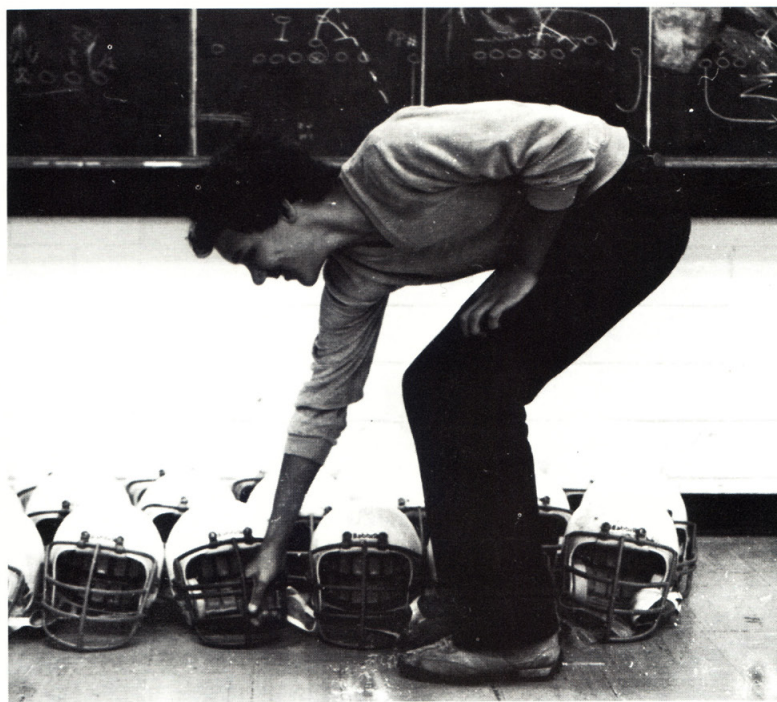

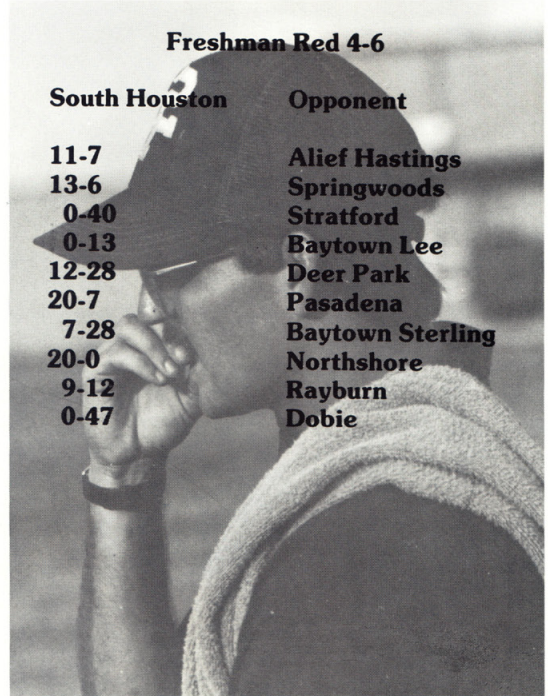

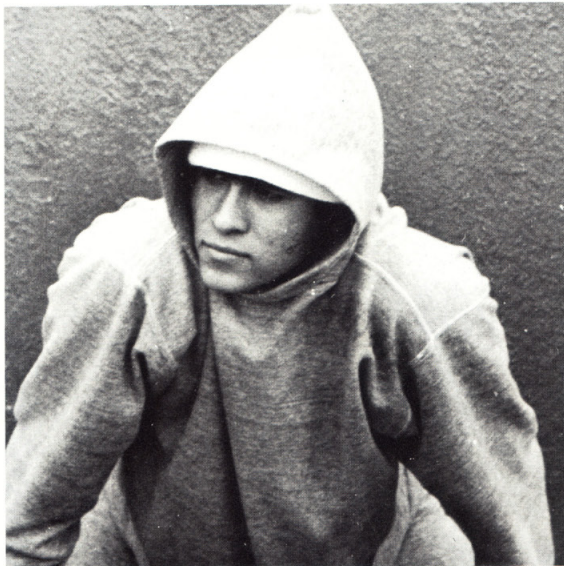
distinguished himself in the State Meet.

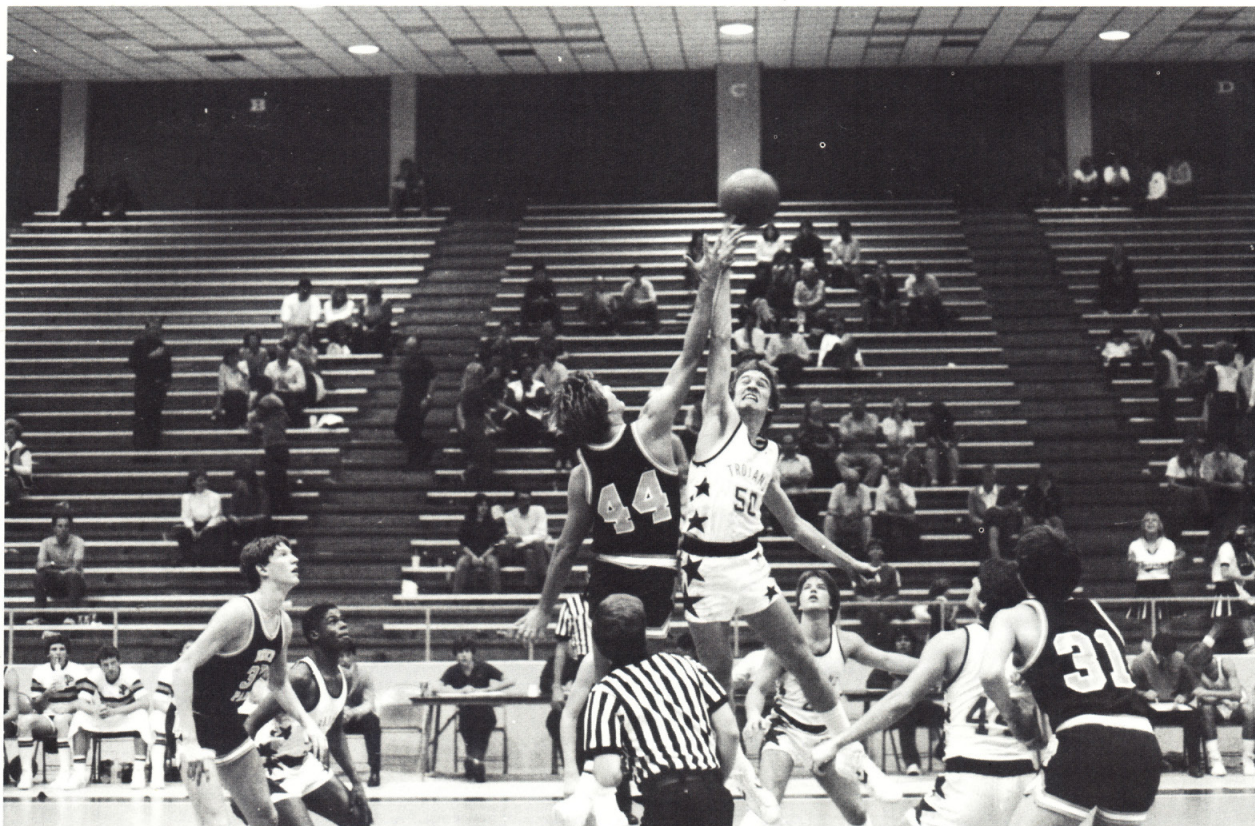

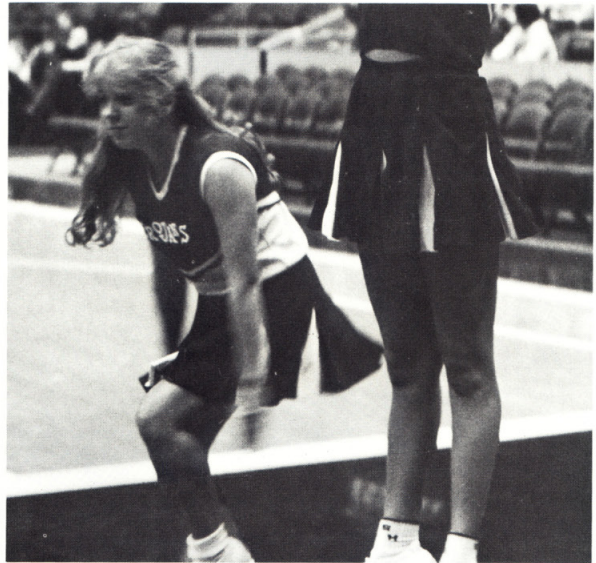
This was cheerleading like only SoHo could produce. The girls proved that their strengths, leadership, and talents were certainly a factor in promoting Trojan Spirit.







Sophomore Angie Crockett beat many good players to win fourth place in the ju

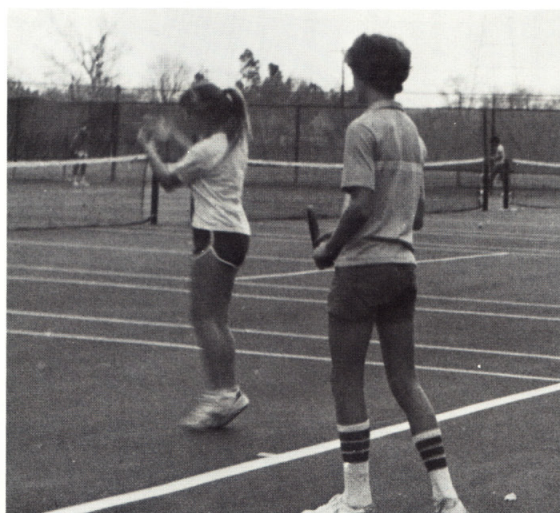
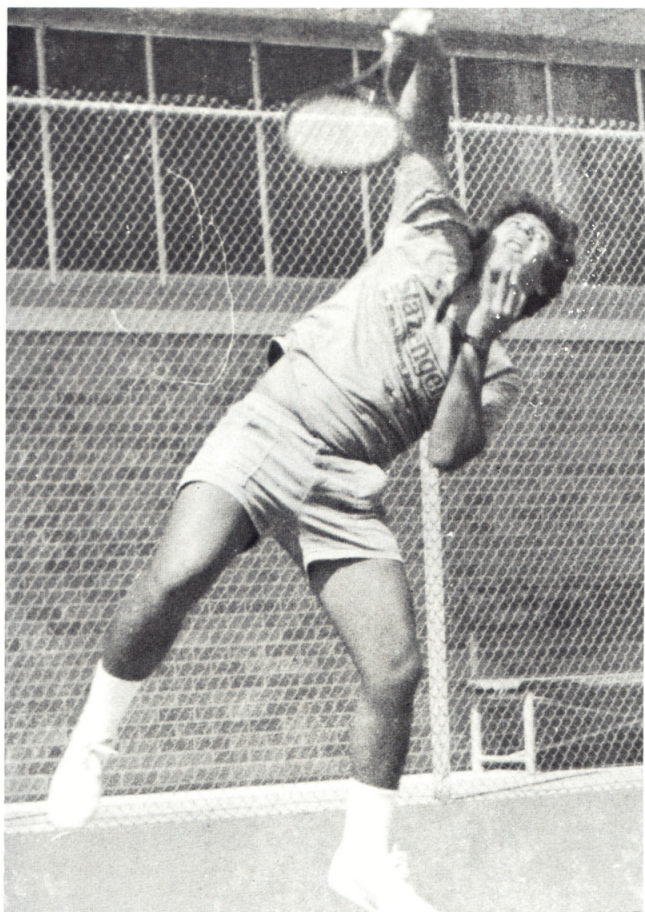
district.

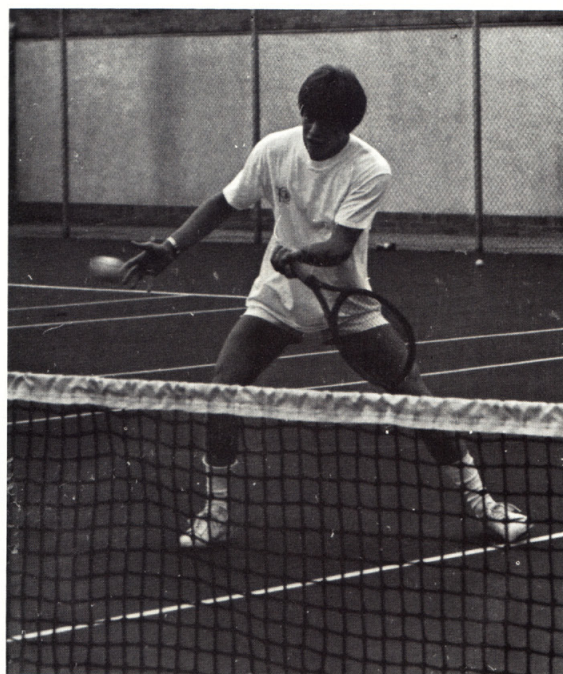
"This year may not have been our greatest year, but I feel next year will see a much better and much improved team. There is much team spirit and this will really help us," concluded sophomore Todd Taylor.

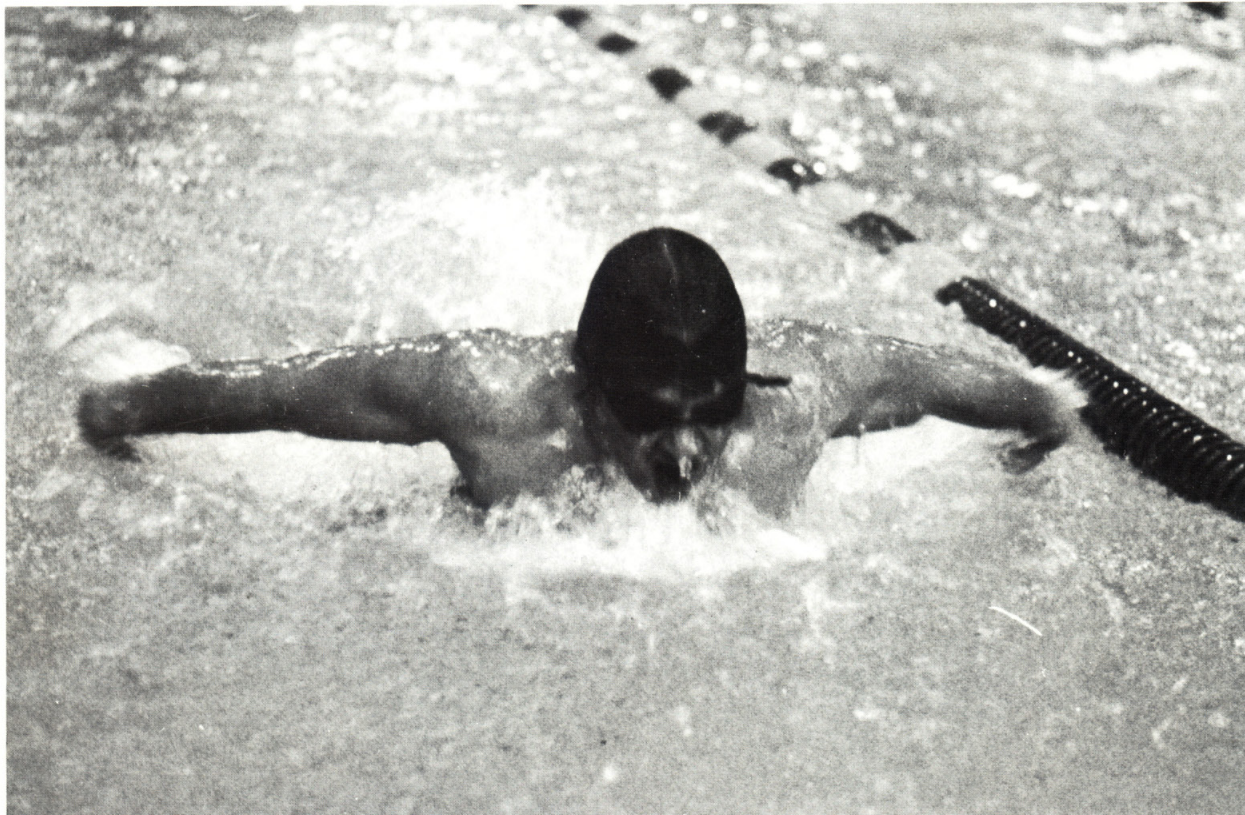

The swim team contained 23 members, 14 of whom were on varsity. The District Meet was held at Baytown

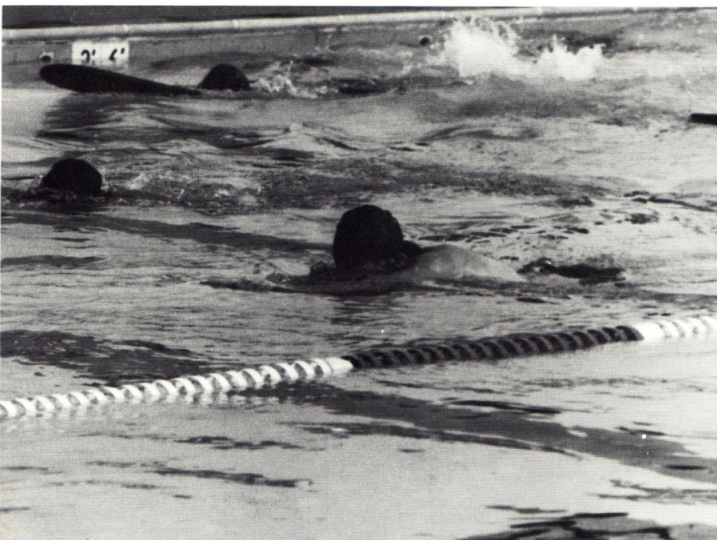
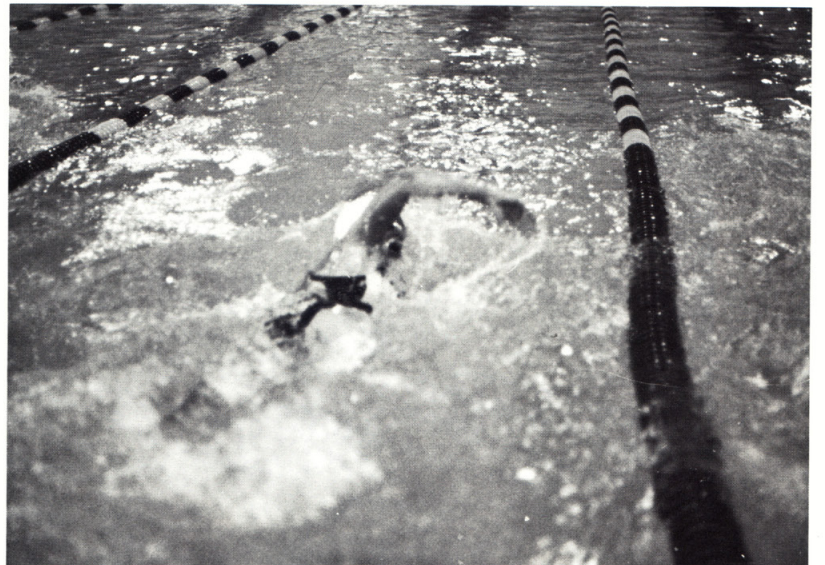
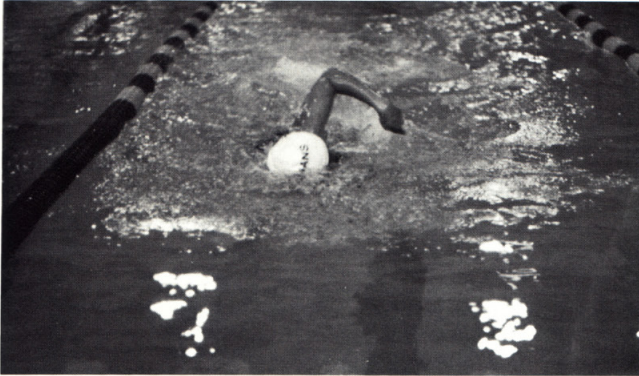
Sterling and a number of the swimmers placed in the top six. Those members ended up going to the Regional Meet at the University of Houston, but none of them placed in the top six.

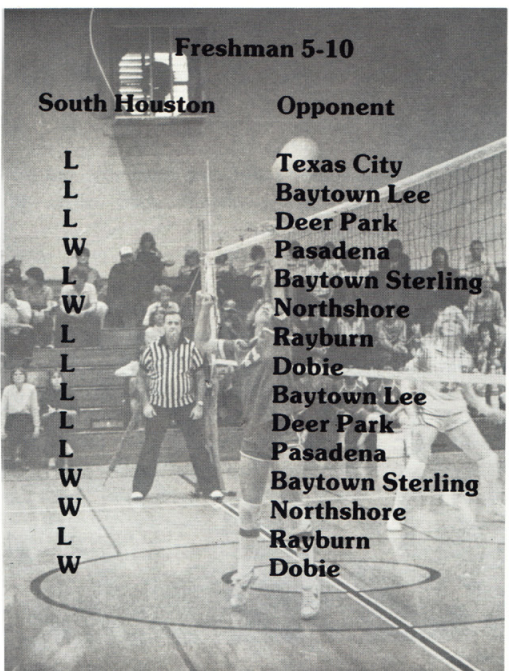

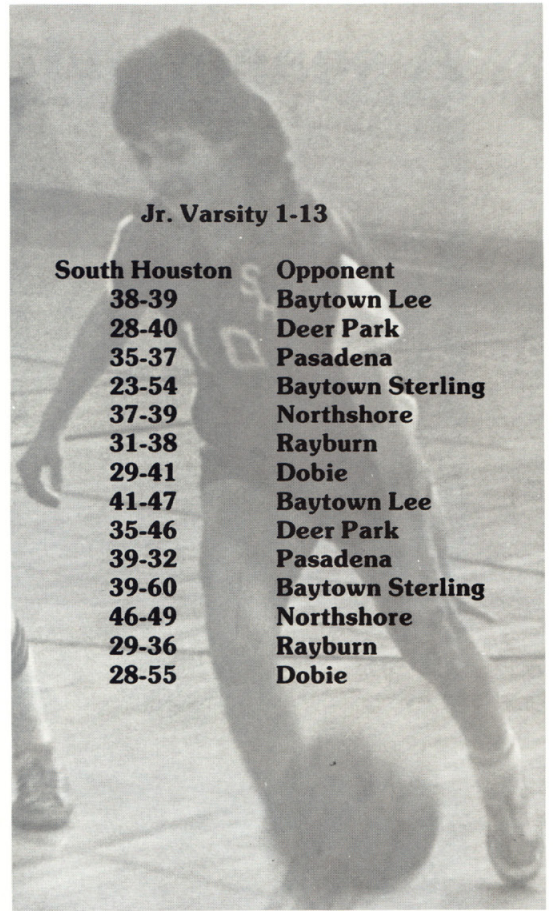

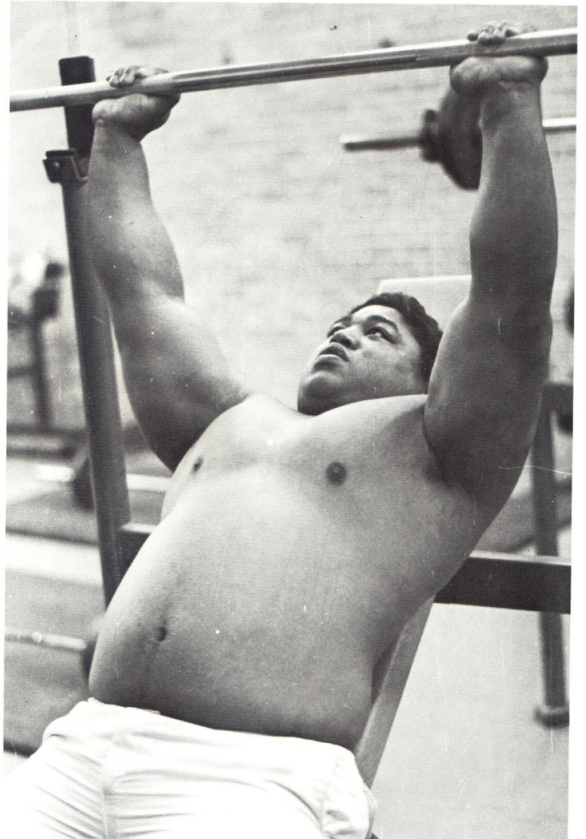
