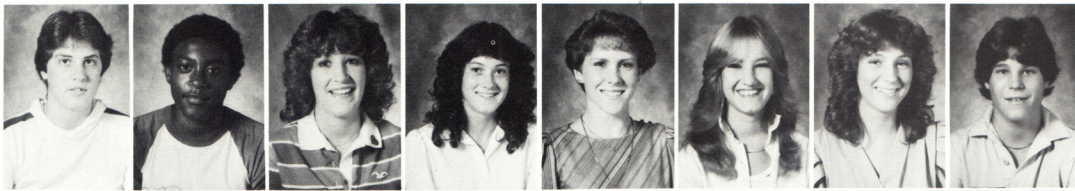
Lee believed that an officer should be, "Someone who gets along with others and one that carries responsibility well."

To contribute to her class, Bonnie said, "I encourage more people to get involved."

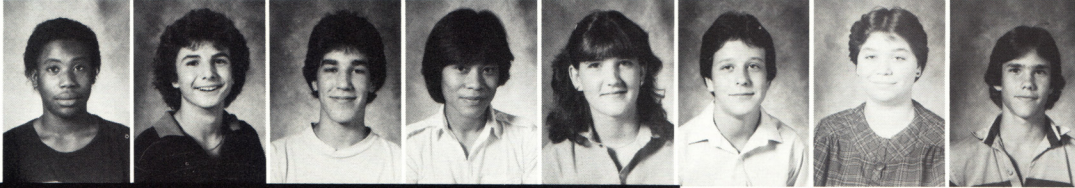
The class sponsors, Mrs. Dixie Mauney and Mr. Don Craig, believed that they had a good group of responsible officers who performed their jobs well.

plained, "I try not to judge the students by their older brothers or sisters, but I feel it can be an advantage if the relative had made a good impression."

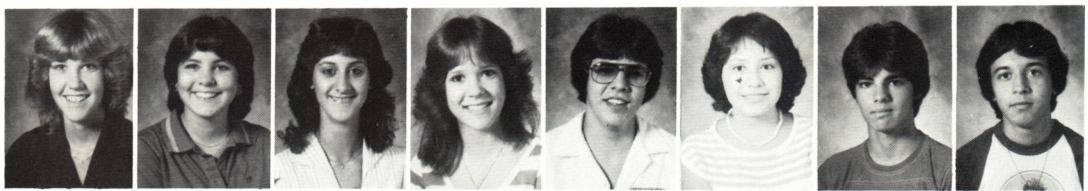

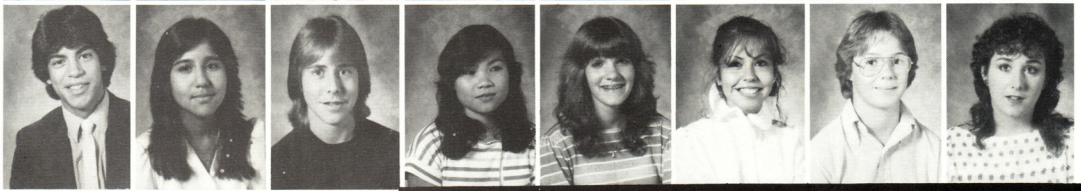

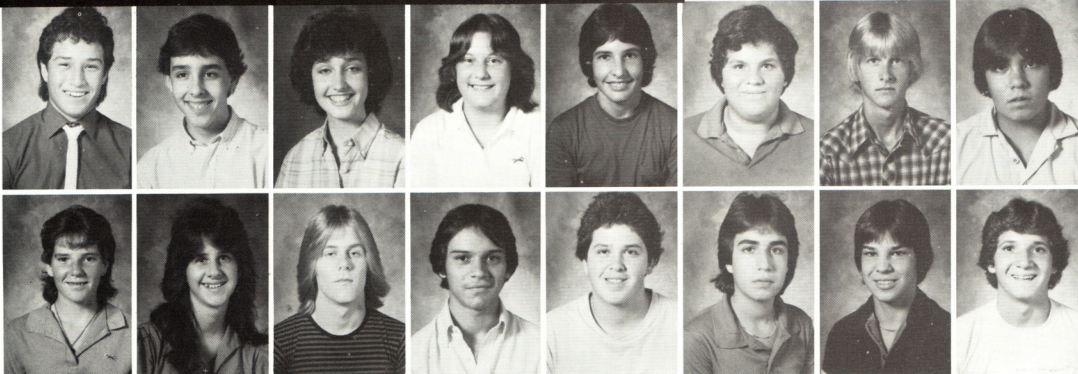
Their futures were planned and they were looking forward to having their dreams become realities. But they were only high school students and anything could happen.

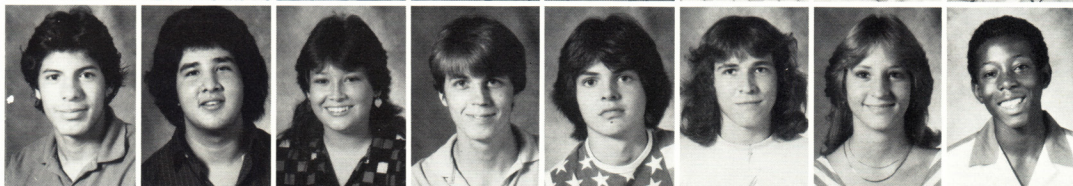
