

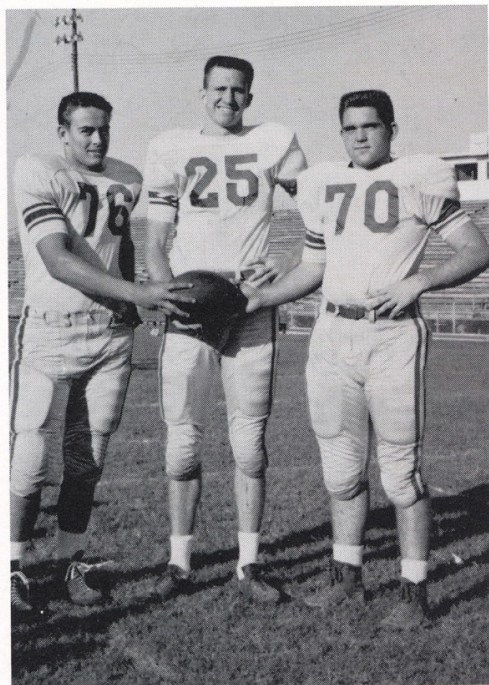

When it came to district play, it was the same story for Pasadena. The Eagles won the first three games and lost the final two. Pasadena beat Brazoport, Spring Branch, Texas City, and was tied for the lead in district 12AAAA competition. Their next game was with Galena Park with whom they were tied. The Eagles looked good in this game, but not good enough, for they went down in defeat. Pasadena's last game was with Baytown who proved to be too much for the Eagles.

Pasadena played a very hard schedule and came out with a well earned record of 6 wins and 4 losses.

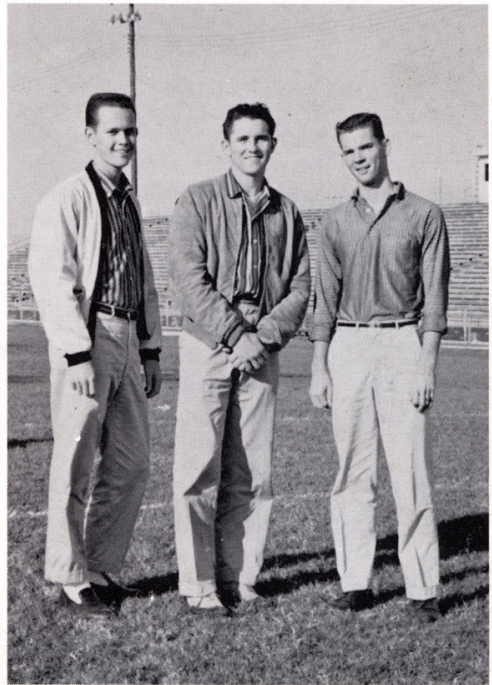

Coaches and team find plenty of things to keep the managers busy—These boys deserve recognition for their contribution to football at P.H.S.

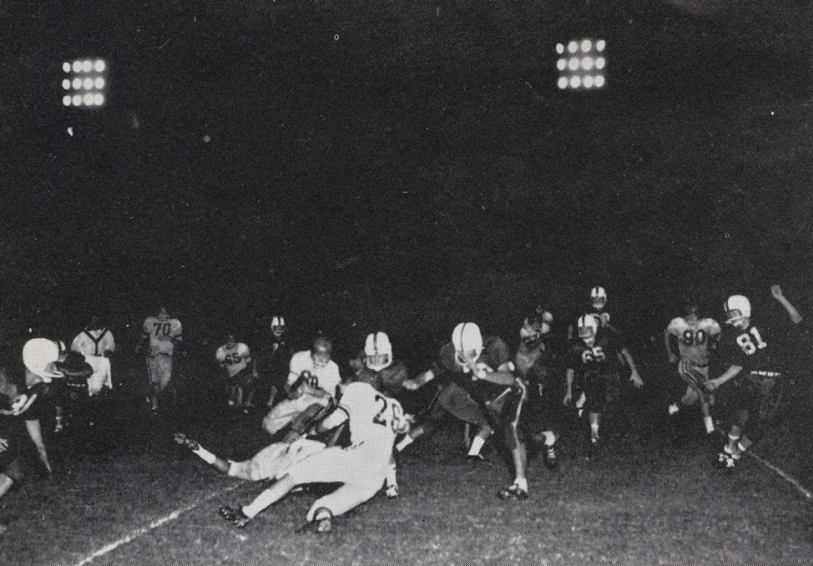

PASADENA—13 ODESSA—7

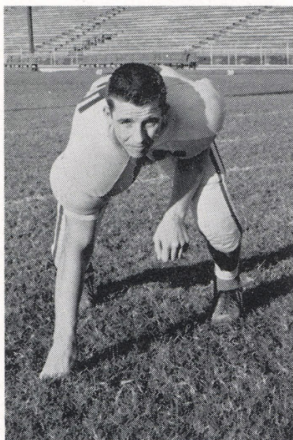
On September 12, the Pasadena Eagles started their season with a 13 to 7 win over Odessa at Eagle stadium in Pasadena.

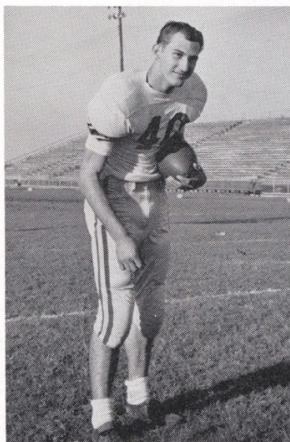

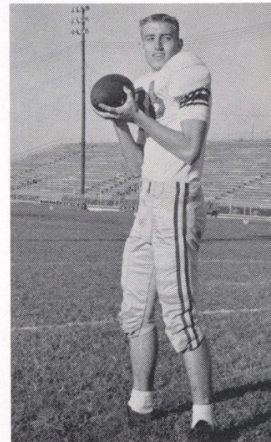
Gerald Batchelor and Carl Choate bringing down hard-running Odessa back.



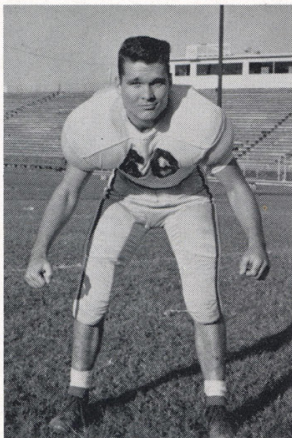

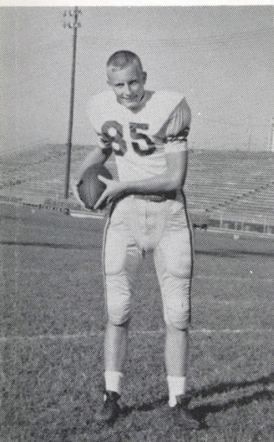

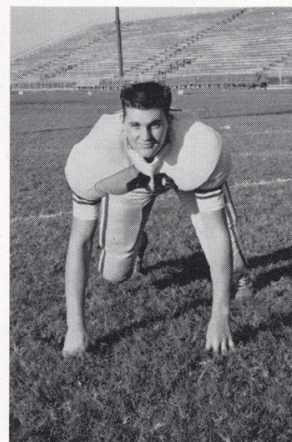
PASADENA—21 LAMAR—0

PASADENA—19 TEXARKANA—27

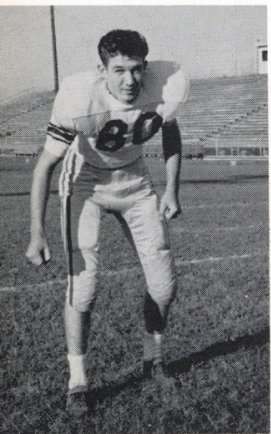

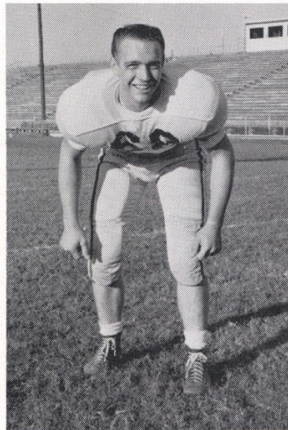
The Eagles dominated the whole fourth quarter with rugged play by Covington, Mathews, Kerbow, Miller, Powitzsky, and Batchelor.



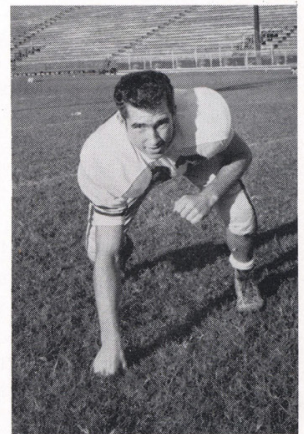
Jimmy Snow being brought down by Texarkana defenders.

Pasadena's Eagle Stadium was packed only to see the Eagles go down in defeat for the second time against the Yellow-jackets of Port Arthur.

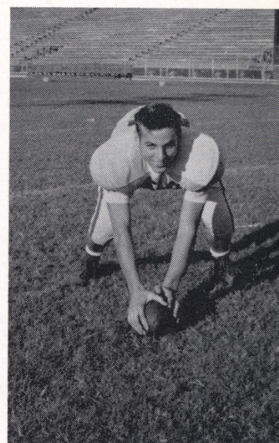

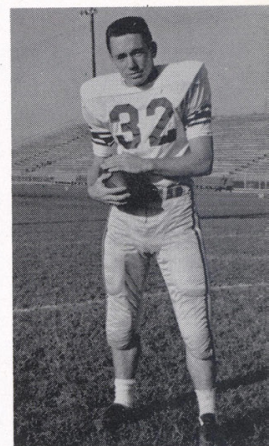

Bert Coan ran wild at Brazosport, behind good blocking, to score four touchdowns and down the Exporters 27-0.

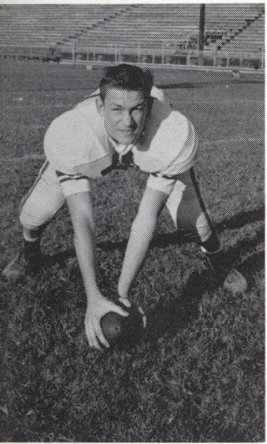

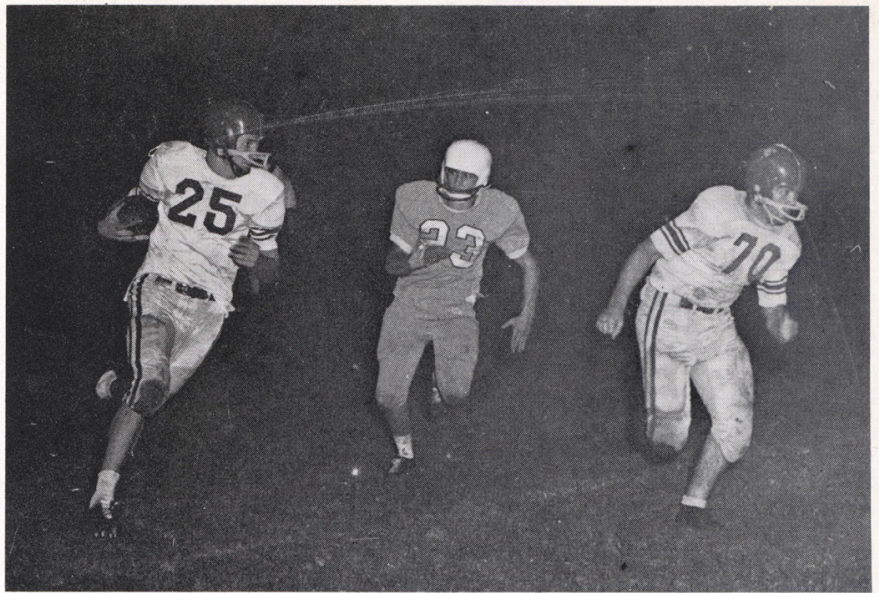

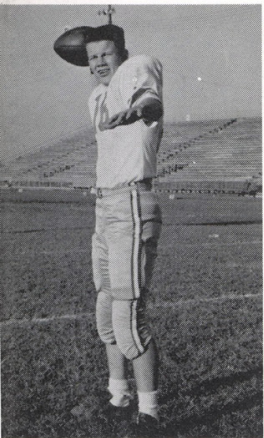
Pass by Kerbow as Powitzky comes in to protect.

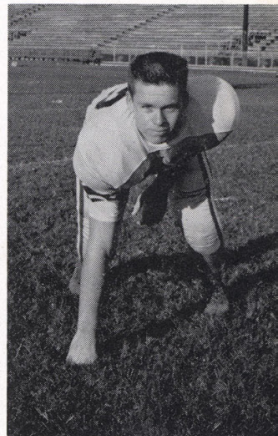

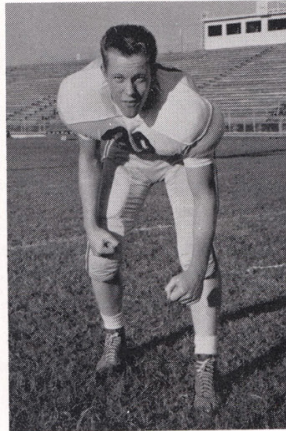

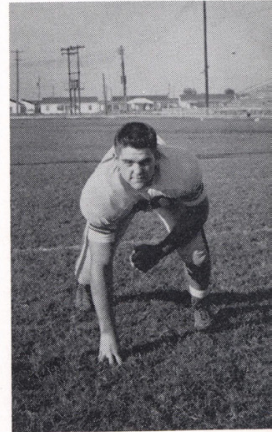
Snow outruns Texas City as Choate, Mathews and Warner try to help out.



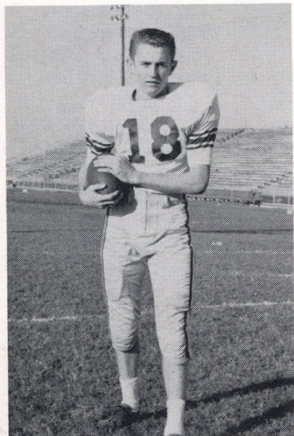

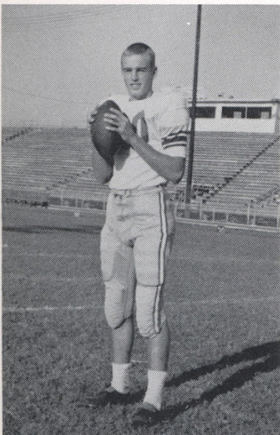

"B" TEAM (South Houston Trojans)

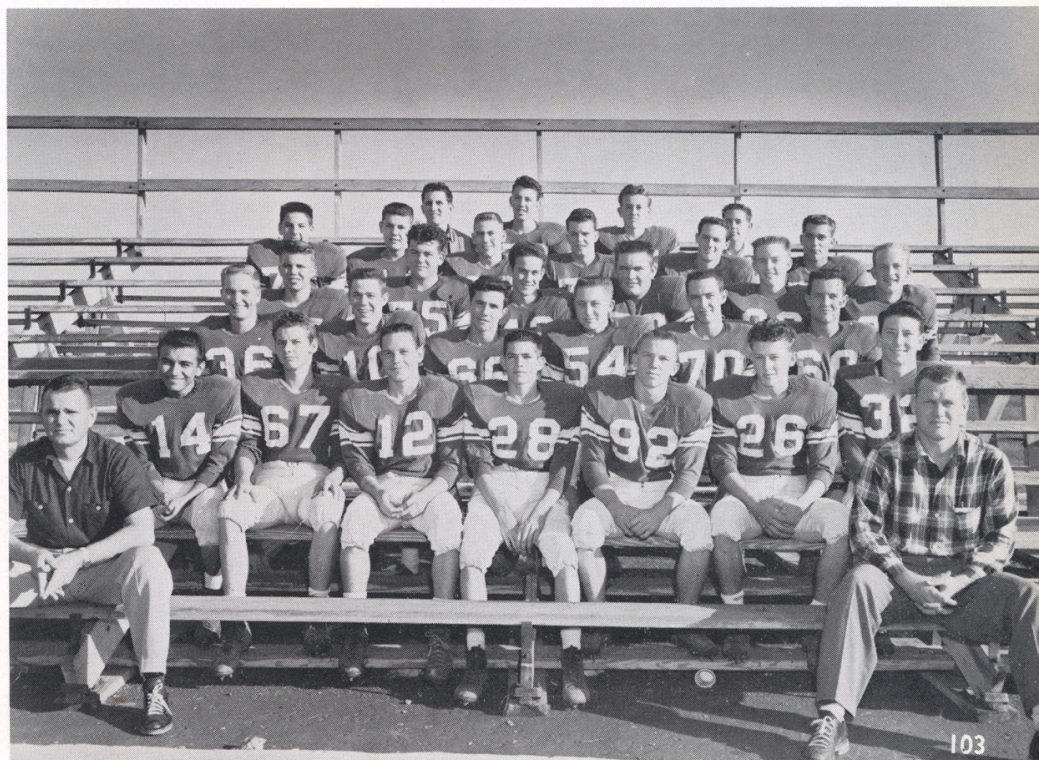

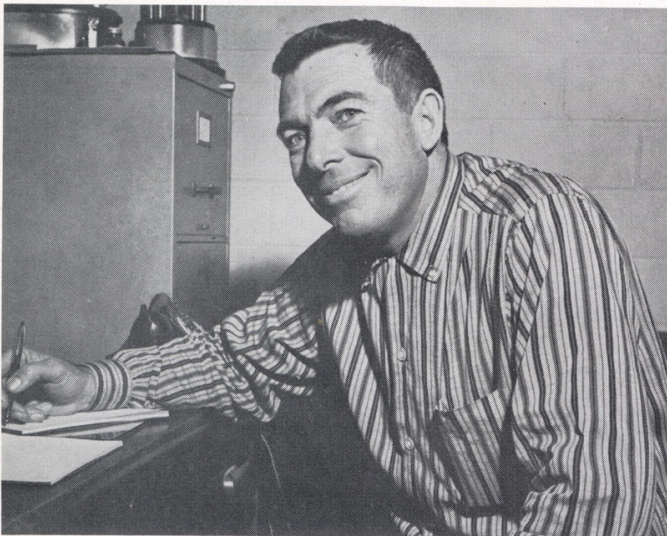

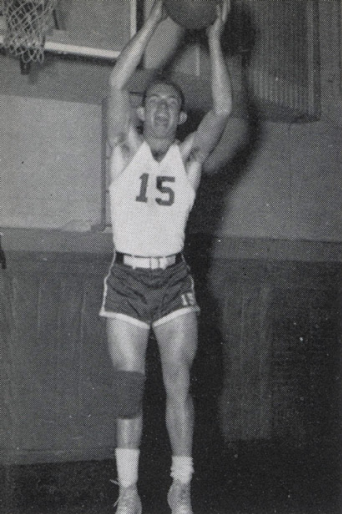

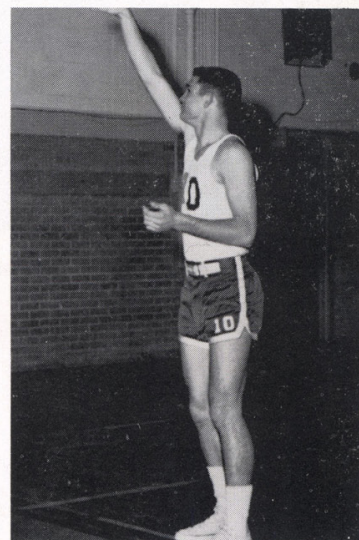

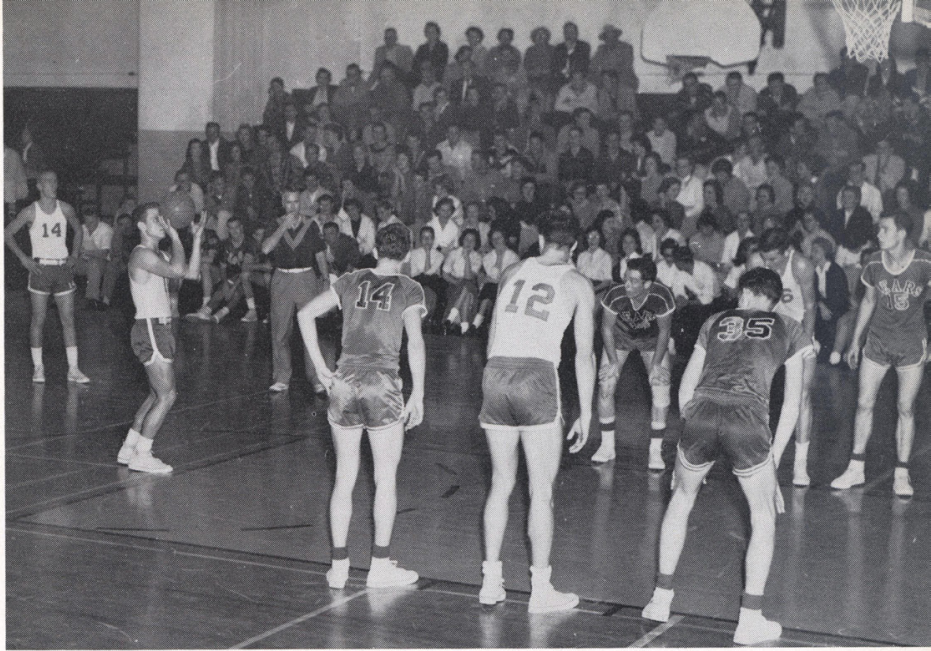

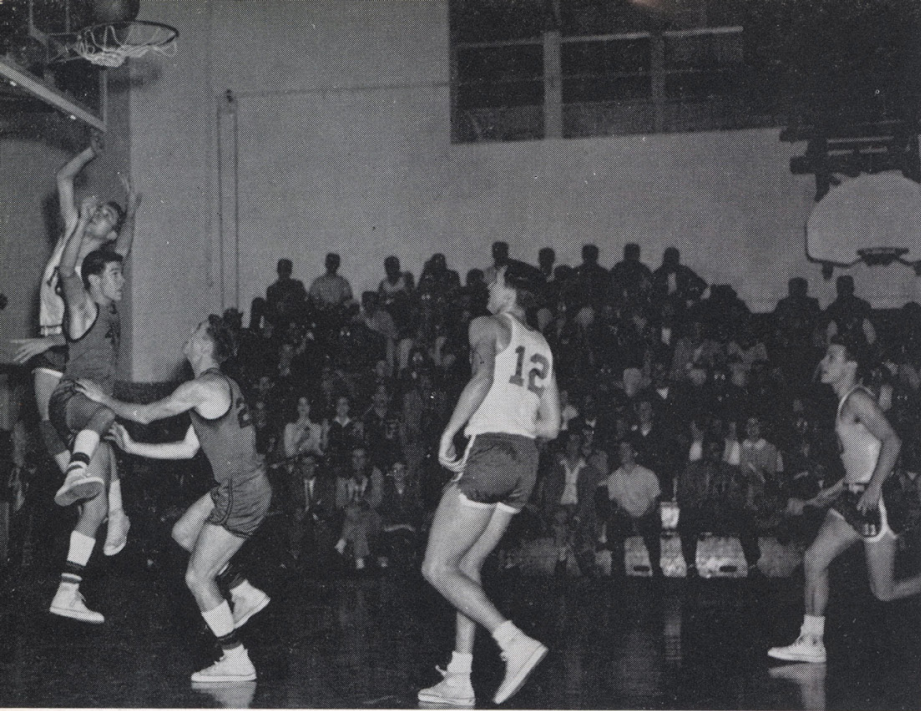

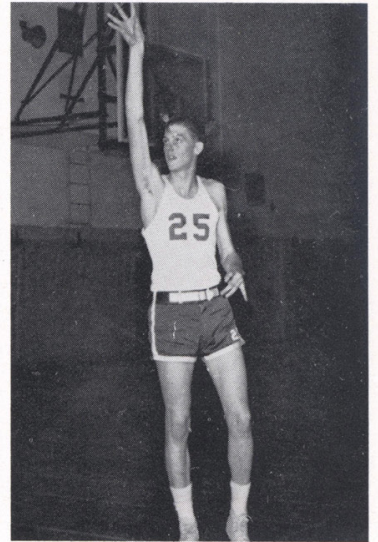

TRACK . . . STATE CROWN HOLDERS OF '57

Pasadena's hard-running Eagles of '57 brought home our first State Championship since 1946. The team really went all out for this accomplishment.

During the season track meets, Pasadena was one of the big three state threats, but only managed to bring home one first place trophy. They seemed to fall behind Baytown or Lamar in every occasion. But when it came to the State Meet, they fell behind no one.

The Eagles captured first places in the following events: 440 yard relay, 16 points; 100 yard dash, 10 points; 220 yard dash, 10 points; and broad jump, 10 points. This accounted for forty-six points and a state championship.

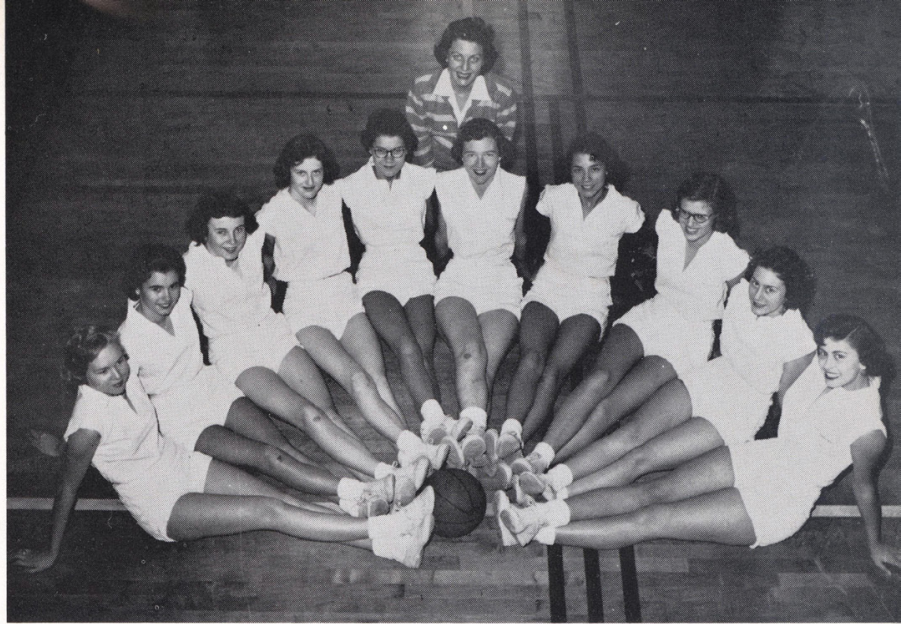
