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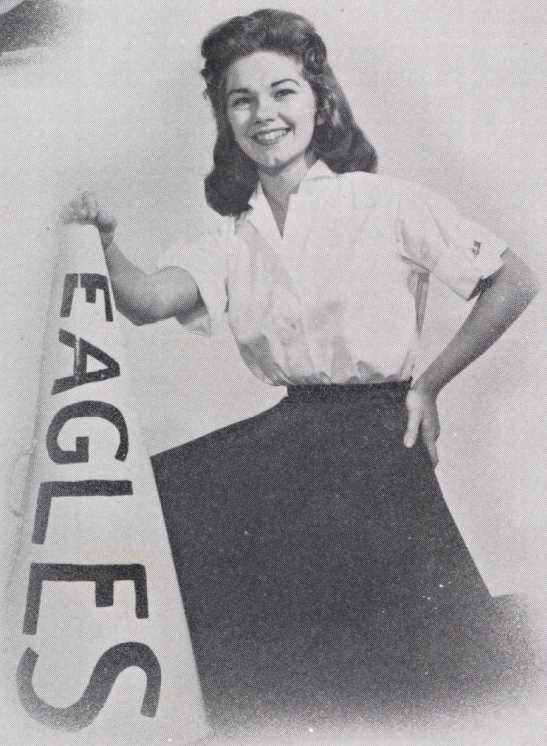

The highest student selected honor is to be Mr. or Miss P.H.S. The winners represent the decision of the student body as to the two who have contributed most to our high school this year.

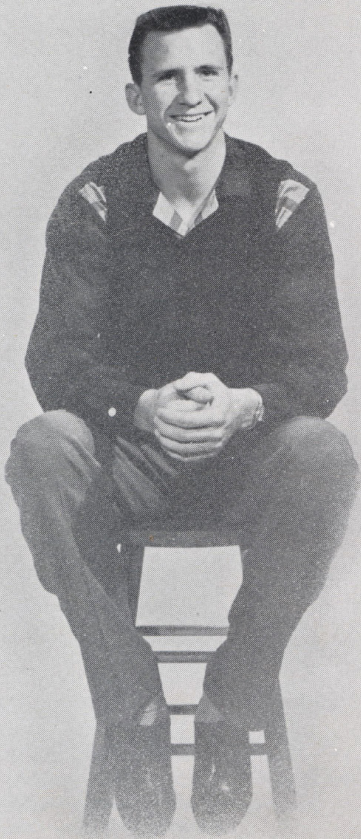

Dickie Rosenthal, student body president, piloted the Student Council with the help of vice president Alvern Gartman.



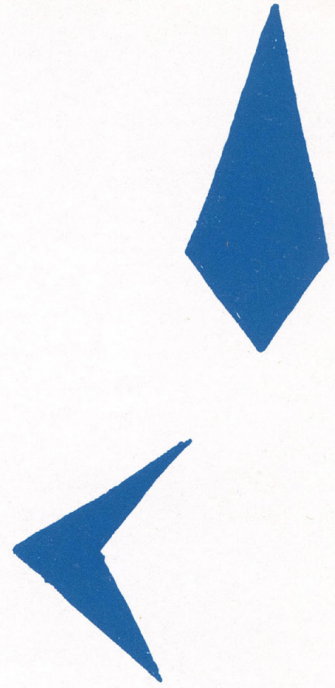

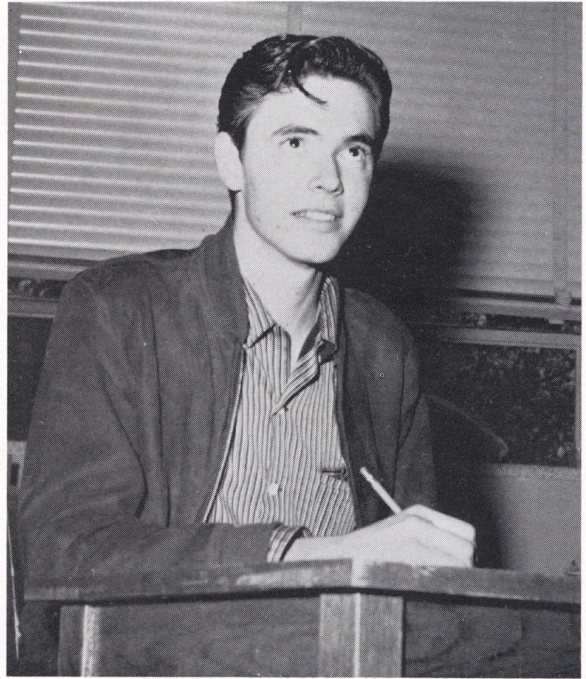
Claudia Hammond won the Daughters of the American Revolution award. Senior homeroom sponsors nominated senior girls and the whole faculty voted on these nominations.

Doylene Byrd and Ronnie Willis were members of the staff of the '57 Pasadenian that won All-State honors.



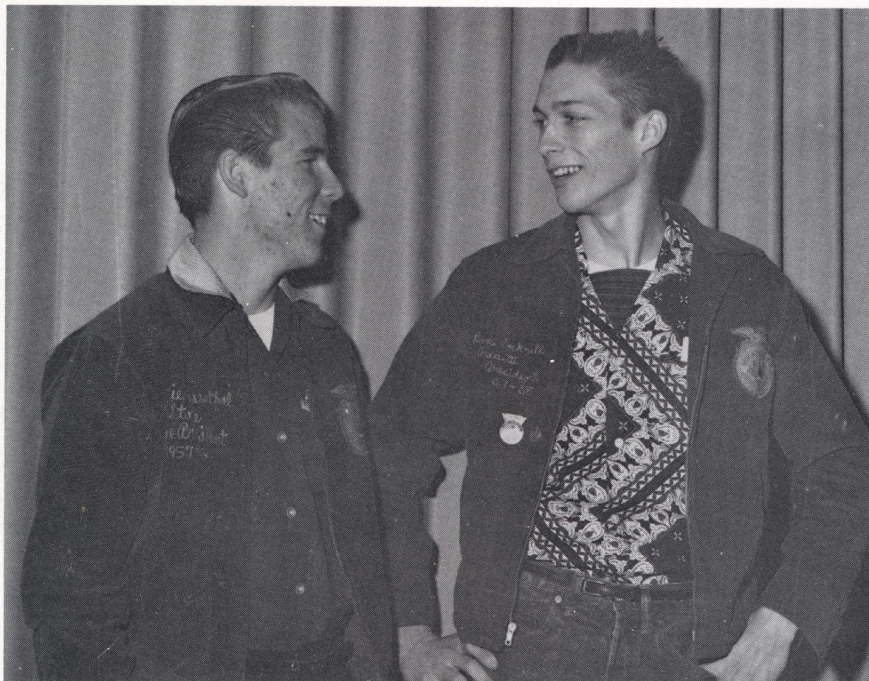
Ben Laws and James McKinney were the P.H.S. band members that made the All-State Band.

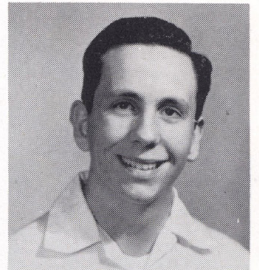

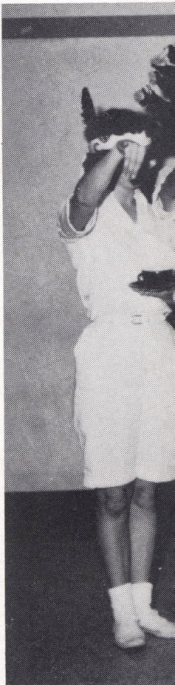

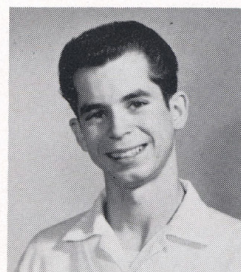
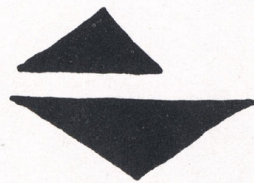


Basketball was a vital part of P.H.S. during the winter months as the cheerleaders, fans, and coaches helped our team win the district championship and go to regional tournament.

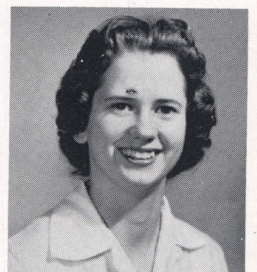

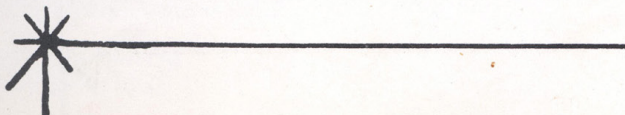

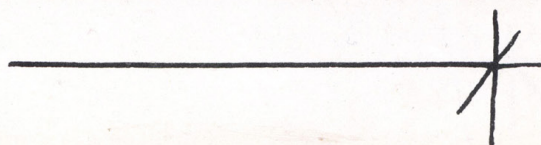
