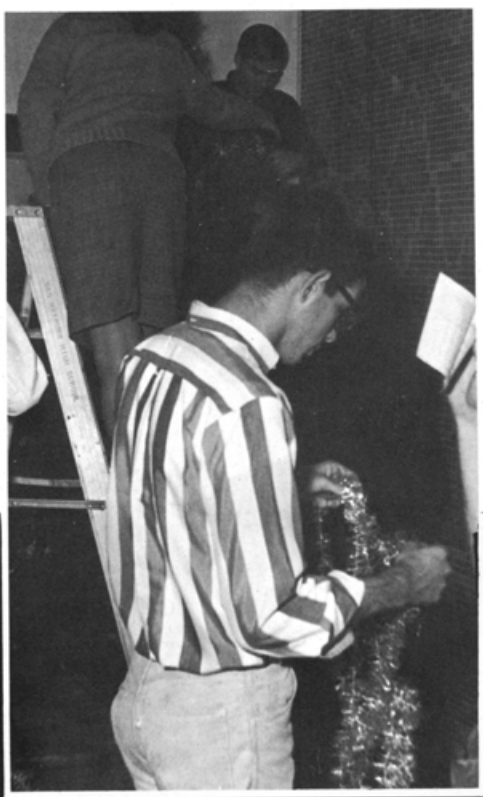

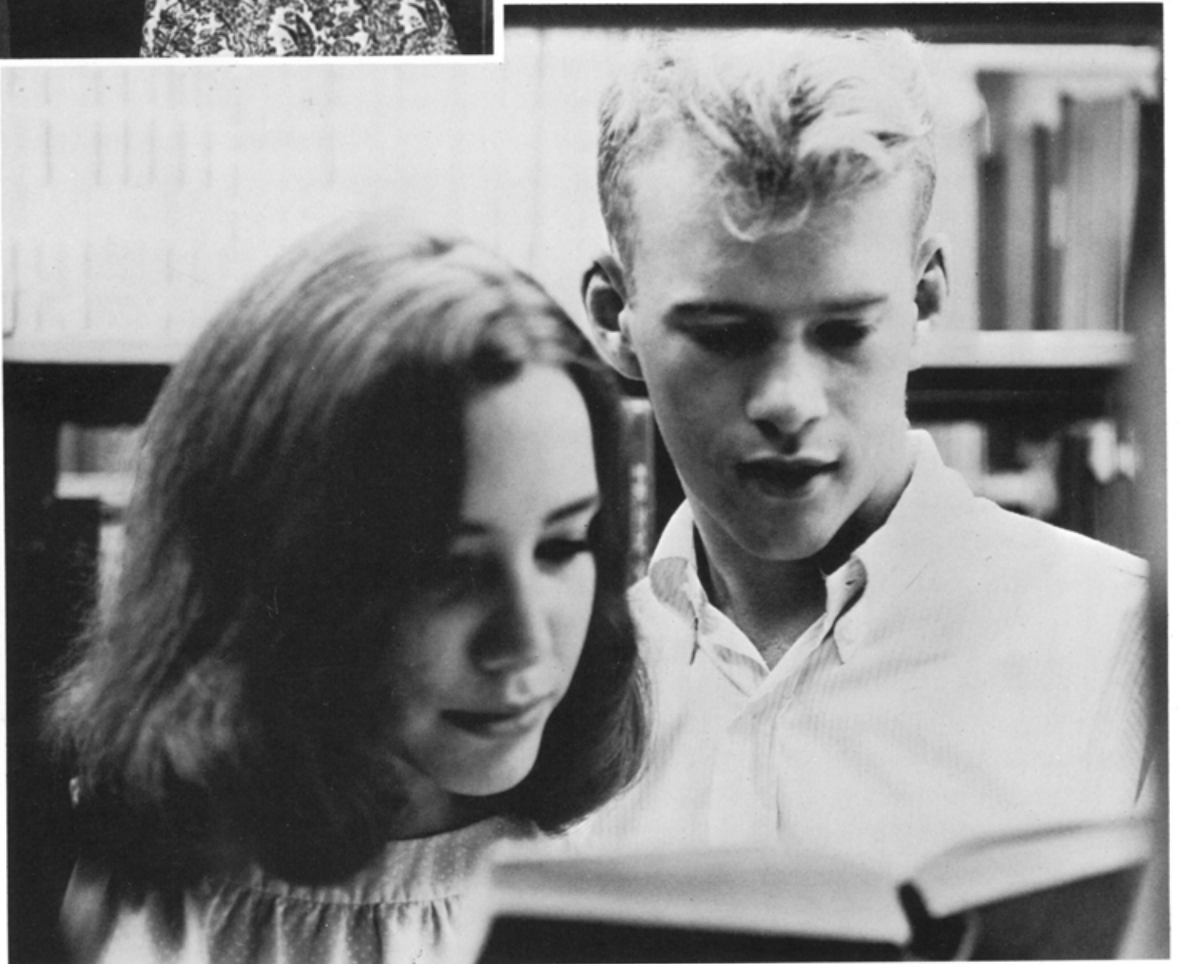

# Spirited Pep Rallies

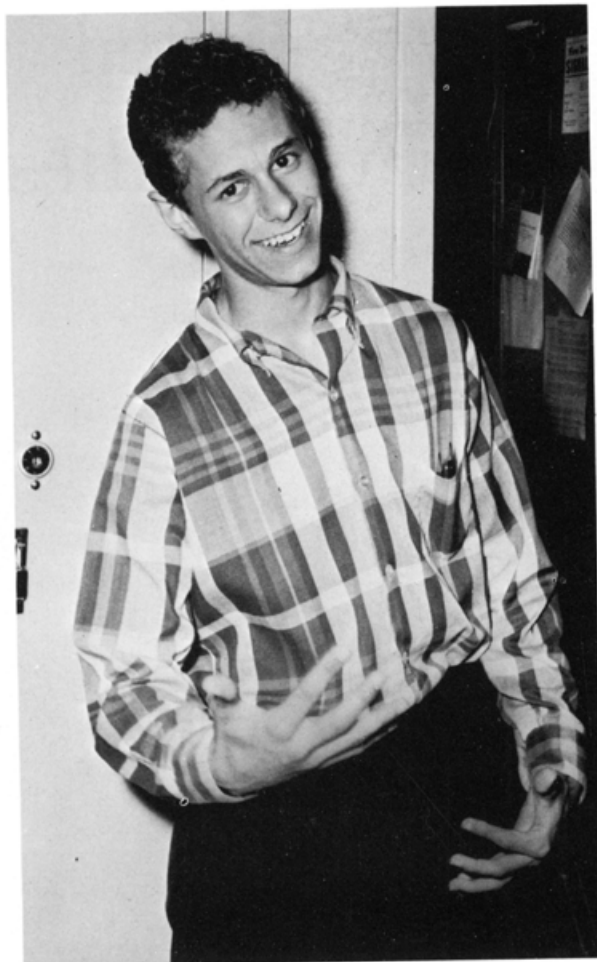

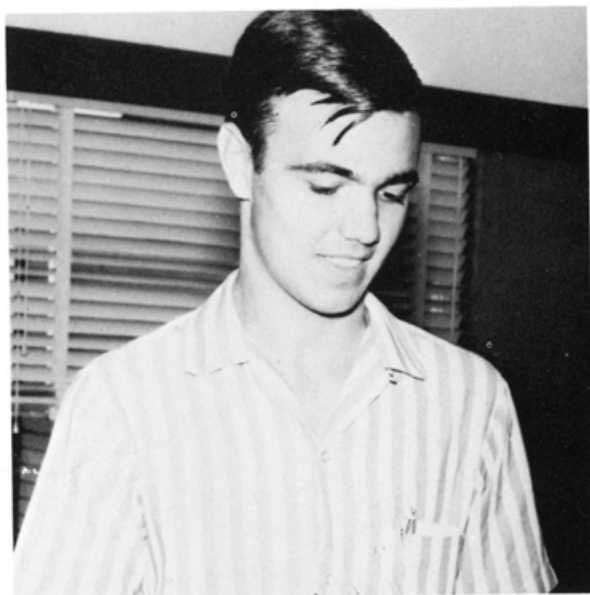


# Speech Wins

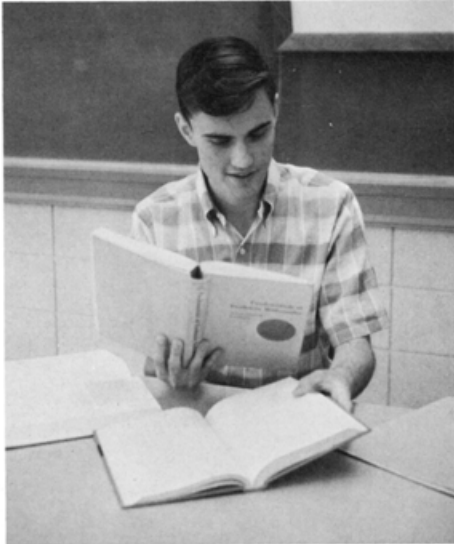

The purpose for having Junior Rotarians is to better acquaint a representative percentage of active students with the principles and ideas of the Rotary International and to better promote civic activities.

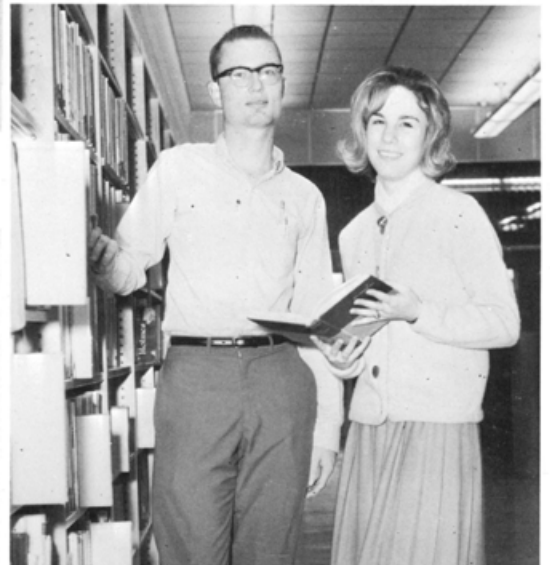

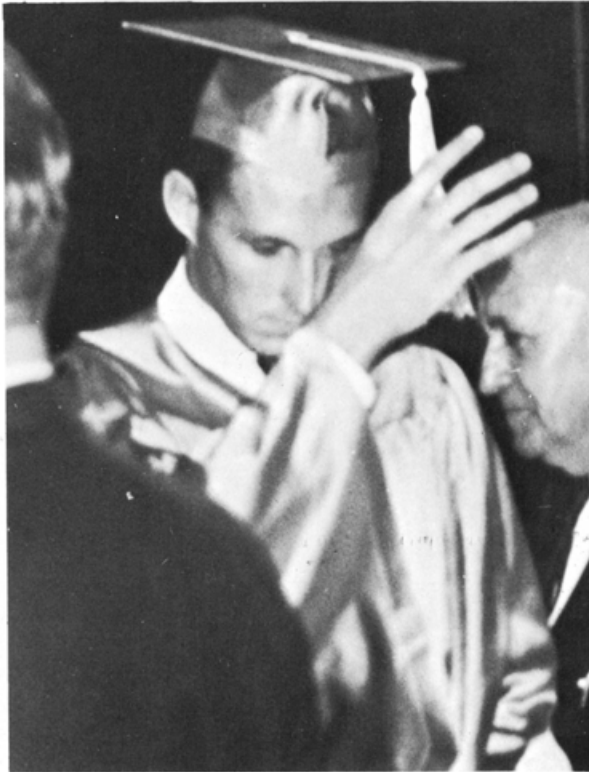

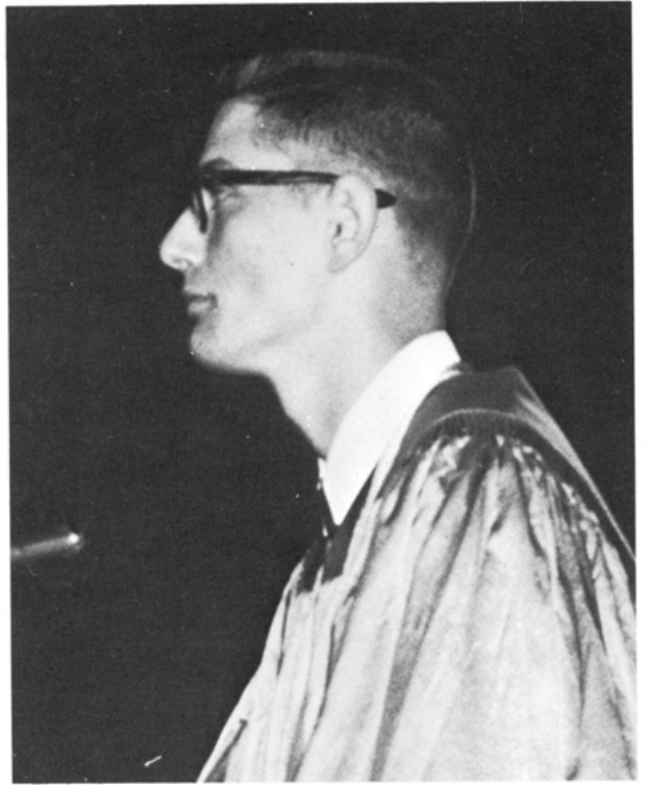
